Guidance for the Application of Emergency-Only Distance Ed (DX) Delivery

- The DX were never intended for use as permission to schedule classes online; rather, their original intent was to allow courses to be moved online in an emergency situation: "...in the case of a campus/college/district closure emergency; this form does not otherwise authorize online or hybrid course delivery" (Emergency-Only Proposal form).
- In Spring 2021, the curriculum chairs made two statements in a message that went out to rccdall on March 18, 2021 and that was co-signed by the Academic Senate Presidents, effectively temporarily amending that use:
 - o Fall 21 should be a transitional semester and allow DX to be used for scheduling in order to allow faculty to get their DE in on time: "Our Emergency-Only approvals authorize DE delivery of any classes that start on campus but are forced back online or hybrid at any point by a site closure; as outlined in the original process, courses with emergency-only approvals are authorized for online delivery for any future RCCD emergency that prohibits onsite instruction (partial or total). It is the position of the District Curriculum Committee and Senate Presidents that the Emergency-Only approvals also cover courses for Fall 2021 deemed appropriate by the discipline to continue offering online or hybrid as we transition out of the emergency. This additional semester of coverage allows departments who may wish to submit permanent DE proposals in time for regular Winter/Spring 2022 scheduling to do so."
 - Faculty should submit standard DE proposals to cover them for Winter/Spring 22: "[F]or Winter and Spring 22, faculty are advised to submit DE proposals to techreview@rccd.edu by April 9, 2021."
- The Curriculum Chairs re-affirm that the purpose of DX approvals was never to allow for scheduling of online courses (except in the case of total campus closure) but rather for courses forced to move online. We acknowledge now in Fall of 21, they also cover classes when a whole class has been temporarily "closed" because of a local quarantine of that class and its students as this is an emergency, though temporary, and this allows instruction to continue uninterrupted.
- The Curriculum Chairs also understand that the pandemic has gone on longer and in varied waves no one anticipated; in light of this and to create clear guidelines going forward, our view regarding the use of DX approvals going forward is as follows:
 - Winter 2022 may be considered an extension of the same "transition out of emergency" period as Fall 21, allowing DX to be used to schedule Winter 2022 if necessary.
 - From Spring 22 forward, DX can no longer be used for regular planned scheduling of courses unless we are in a shutdown mode as in 2020.
 - To support faculty who may not have met the original April 9 deadline for DE or still not have submitted DE for courses they wish to continue offering online or hybrid in Spring 22 and for which no DE approval exists, DE proposals submitted with required district discipline and originating department minutes to techreview@rccd.edu by October 8 should be able to move through the curricular process in time before the Spring schedule is published and be offered with DE delivery.
 - Courses scheduled online or hybrid for Spring 22 without DE approved in time should revert to face-to-face delivery or be cancelled, per consultation with VPAA, Deans, and faculty.
 - Note that Summer and Fall 22 DE proposals may make approval deadlines if launched by the first day of Spring 22 at the very latest, but since they require discipline and department conversation, it is better to complete and launch them by the end of Fall 21.

Standard Distance Ed (DE) & Emergency-Only Distance Ed (DX) Usage for 2022 forward

Winter 2022 - DX can be used to schedule online/hybrid classes if needed.

Spring 2022 forward - DX will not be used to schedule classes online/hybrid.

DE proposals for Spring 2022 must be submitted with district discipline and originating department minutes by October 8, 2021.

Submit DE proposals for Summer and Fall 2022 with district discipline and originating department minutes by the end of Fall 2021.

New Programs: Degrees

In accordance with RCCD Board Policy 5775 item 6 ("Encouragement of curriculum in environmental sustainability"), and District Strategic Plan 2019-24 Objective 6.1 ("Establish and expand relationships with regional educational institutions"), an Associate of Arts degree in Sustainability is proposed at RCC. A survey of local schools found that while many universities offer higher degrees in Sustainability, no Associate Degree programs appear to be available in our area to prepare students for transfer. The degree is designed to fulfill IGETC requirements as well as basic requirements for the University of California, Riverside B.A. in Environment and Sustainability Studies and for Sustainability degrees at other institutions of higher education. While the courses will ensure that

RCC students are well-prepared to transfer and complete a Sustainability degree at any university, courses were specifically chosen to create a smooth and efficient pipeline for Sustainability students to UCR, since this is where many of our students will choose to transfer. RCC faculty communicated closely with UCR faculty during the mapping of this associate degree.

As was made clear by the recent Resolution of the Board of Governors, California Community Colleges (No. 2019-11), sustainability must be a priority for the CCCs and this includes the need to provide valuable education to our students. According to a recent report, the global green technology and sustainability market size is set to grow from \$11.2 billion in 2020 to \$36.6 billion by 2025. And, According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, more than half of the growth in employment expected by 2026 will be in eco-friendly occupations. A Sustainability degree will help lead our students to a fulfilling job and a more stable future.

AB 361 amended the Brown Act, adding language to the Government Code that allows teleconferencing until January 1, 2024, but only with the stricter provisions of listing every teleconference location in advance on the agenda, and making each site available to the public. (So for example, if you need to teleconference from your home, we'd have to list your home address and you'd have to allow the public to join you if they wish.)
 - 2. Government Code 54953 allows legislative bodies to meet remotely without listing on the agenda the locations from which members will teleconference [through March 2022] during a declared state of emergency so long as the body agendizes the item every month and finds by majority vote that "(i) The state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of members to meet safely in person" or that "(ii) State or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing."

This proposal gives a more accurate and more broad description of what this course is designed to do for musicians and related artists - primarily focusing on entrepreneurship (in general) for musicians and related artists. It touches upon the physiological, social, and psychological elements of being an artist in today's times. This course is almost word-forword a direct copy of a course that is already approved and implemented at Cal Poly Pomona, in their Music Industry Studies program. At Cal Poly it is a music major requirement (for all music majors), and it doubles as a GE Area E course. Non-majors regularly take the course to learn about current music and artist careers, as well as how to be an entrepreneur in any related field, or in any field where one can work up the ladder as an independent entrepreneur. We need to approve this in GE Area E, the same as Cal Poly, to facilitate graduation and articulation to the Cal Poly Pomona Music Industry Studies program, specifically. While it needs to remain semi-focused on music, it really is more of an entrepreneurship and lifelong learning class than anything else. That's where its breadth of knowledge comes in, and why it is recognized as a GE Area E course for Cal Poly. We are hoping we can align with Cal Poly on this so that our students can more easily articulate from here to there without having to take an unnecessary, additional GE Area E course, which is a waste of units, time, and money for our students. 		In the event of a major disaster, first responders (fire, police, EMS) will be overwhelmed and will not be able to meet community service demands. Communication failures, road blockages, and the high demand for public safety agencies will prevent people from obtaining aid during the first 96 hours of the event. People will have to rely on each other for help in order to meet their immediate lifesaving and life sustaining needs. CERT training presents citizens with the facts about what to expect following a major disaster. CERT training addresses personal responsibility for emergency preparedness and trains volunteers to deliver lifesaving skills with an emphasis on decision-making, rescue safety, and doing the greatest good for the greatest number. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has developed a nationwide curriculum with required outcomes to ensure uniformed training throughout America.

CERT is a positive and realistic approach to emergency and disaster situations where citizens will be initially on their own and their	N

actions can make a difference. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the Emergency Management Institute (EMI), and the National Fire Academy recognize the importance of CERT programs to assist professional responders following a disaster.

California Government Code, Title 1, Division 4, Chapter 8, Section 3100 designates public employees as Disaster Service Workers. "Disaster Service Workers are required to report to work in an emergency and are expected to make every effort to fulfill emergency action assignments." This does not mean that everyone has to be trained as a CERT member, but the information and resources can help in the event of an emergency. Community Emergency Response Teams are formed to be better prepared for the hazards and emergencies which can threaten our communities. CERT participation is voluntary. However, our actions as public employees require us to act during a disaster in some form.

Program Modification

This degree path is designed for the professional development of Firefighters. This change more accurately aligns courses conducive to the needs and career progression of the aforementioned customer. Firefighters currently receive formal ethics training which rendered the current ethics courses (FIT-M20 & FIT-M21) ineffective for this purpose. The instructor courses will make this degree pathway more attractive based on these courses currently being required for their professional advancement.

- a. Curriculum Chair Kelly Douglass
 - i. AB 1111 is the bill to create a common course numbering system across CCCs that is going to have us changing our course numbers throughout the state. How it happens will be in some way out of our hands, particularly the numbers, and the timeline will most likely also be out of our hands because there are groups at the State Chancellor's Office that are meeting to figure out the timeline. - iii. Bobbie Grey Approved, voting on the CHE 17 (Intro to Development of Modern Science), which hasn't been taught in 20 years. Scheduled to teach in the fall. Having an enormously hard time finding textbooks and resources that are non-European based. It's about the history of how science developed and most scientists are white males, and if anyone has any articles, textbooks, podcasts, videos, please forward to Bobbie Grey.

 - 1. Parissa Clark You are 90% more likely to remember something if you teach it to someone else. Projects where students design their own lessons

- and teach a family or community member are very successful and came up in the anti-racist pedagogy session I mentioned.
- 2. Amy Vermillion Eddie Perez spoke with School of Nursing. For Nursing, we try to use multiple measure assessments, but at the end of the day, the discipline has to be able to take a test because that's how they are licensed. A student may have the option to do a project, do an essay, or take an exam, they can have a variety of choices to meet the outcome, but then they come into Nursing and it is different because they have to be able to pass the national licensing exam, and the caliber of the exam is getting ready to significantly step up.
- 3. Discussion ensued about flexibility in meeting student learning outcomes in some disciplines while that flexiblity may not exist in other fields, as with nursing which in part is preparing students for a state licensing exam, with the point made that students can do well on the non-exams as well on exams. They are not mutually exclusive. Further discussion of changes in pedagogy based on professional development, pedagogy research but also COVID related shifts in teaching with Vermillion noting that some students are experiencing a shock in nursing where their exams are more heavily weighted towards their grade. Discussion ended with note that transparency with students is important, standards and transferability requirements etc. in foundational classes still have to be met, even as faculty are trying to expand to additional ways of showing proficiency.

Student Transfer Achievement Reform Act of 2021: Associate Degree for Transfer Intersegmental Implementation Committee

- Requires singular lower division GE Pathway for the CSU and UC
- Auto placement of students on ADT pathway by August 1, 2024 where the student indicates transfer as goal and that major exists at the college as an ADT; Students can opt out
- ICAS (Intersegmental Committee of the Academic Senates of the University of California) to establish singular lower division pattern

- On April 25, 2022, the Intersegmental Committee of Academic Senates (ICAS) received and voted to approve a recommendation from the ICAS Special Committee on AB 928 (Berman, 2021) that revises the current Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC) framework. It will provide a singular transfer pathway that holds the total number of course units to 34 as required by the law while maintaining many key curricular elements important to faculty and moreover beneficial to students of all three systems.

- UC will accept Oral Communication as a new (third) course in Area 1-English Communication The CCC will revise and strengthen courses fulfilling the Oral Communication subject requirement to meet new core competencies.
- The number of courses required in Area 3 -Arts and Humanities will decrease from three to two (one in Arts, one in Humanities).
- UC will remove its Language Other than English proficiency requirement from IGETC and treat it as a graduation requirement.
- CSU will remove its Lifelong Learning and Self-Development course from IGETC and treat it as an upper-division requirement.
- Will include Area 7 Ethnic Studies.
