 - i. Email copies of the discipline's proposal before the Feb. 27, 3pm meeting to Kelly Douglass for presentation at the Curriculum Committee meeting.
 - ii. Make clear the proposed changes to the Dec. 2023 local GE Plan the discipline is advocating for, using the basic guidelines provided in DCC and Standards Chair Ann Pfeifle's December 11 message (see agenda appendix for complete email):
 - Look at your college's current Gen Ed plan in the catalog ("Graduation Requirements for the Associate Degree, Plan A": MVC pp. 43-45; NC pp. 39-41 RCC pp. 66-68; page numbers are the pdf printed version of the catalog, not the online reader numbers);
 - 2. Look at the attached current Title 5 requirements and recommendations;
 - 3. Look at the attached current Gen Ed proposal for 24-25;
 - 4. Consider whether there any differences between the old and new GE Plan about which you have further questions, different recommendations, or wish to advocate for.

- 5. If so, your discipline should prepare those arguments to bring forward to your college's February 27 curriculum meeting via your curriculum rep. (Note that this is not the usual Gen Ed Modification proposal process; this is about aligning what has already gone through that process in the past and is in our current plan to see what should roll over to the new plan because it still fits the revised Title 5 language. New proposals should be offered later through the regular process.)
- iii. Include a clear discipline approval statement. District discipline is preferred (following one college, one vote rules) but if the presentation is coming from an individual college discipline, please include college discipline vote. District discipline is preferred and helps expedite proposals because the local GE plan is a district plan; there are not separate college GE plans so if the district discipline is not unified, Standards will have to figure out how to address that before the next step.
- iv. The presentation from curriculum reps at the meeting will be to clarify any questions about the proposal that the committee or chair has. There will not be discussion of or argumentation about the proposals at the meeting; discussion will occur at the March 12 Curriculum Committee meeting when the proposals are action items.
- v. As proposed changes are shared to the Curriculum Chair before and up to the Feb. 27 meeting time deadline, the chair will forward them to District Instructional Support Coordinator, Bryan Medina, for compiling for the Academic Standards committee members as a review packet for the Feb. 29 special Standards meeting. (This is a quick turnaround from Feb. 27 to the Special Standards meeting on Feb. 29, so as soon as proposals are ready, please send don't wait until Feb. 27 if possible. This gives committee members more time to review and research any questions in advance if needed.)
