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**New Discipline**

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According to "Commercial Truck Driving in the Inland Empire/Desert Region (IEDR), September 2020, as prepared by the Centers of Excellence, "employment for heavy and tractor-trailer drivers is expected to increase 10% between 2019 and 2024. A total of 4,347 job openings will be available over the five-year timeframe. The 50th percentile, median-level, hourly wage for this occupation is \$22.56, above the \$19.94 per hour self-sustainable hourly wage estimate for a single adult with one child."

"The Centers of Excellence recommends creating new truck and bus driving programs to meet the regional need for more workers." The Centers of Excellence for Labor Market Research Top 100 Middle-Skill Occupations report lists Heavy and Tractor-Trailer Truck Drivers as the occupation with the highest projected demand. In addition, the report estimates 482 openings for Bus Drivers, School or Special Client and an additional 471 openings for Bus and Truck Mechanics and Diesel Engine Specialists, many of whom will also need a Commercial Drivers License (CDL) to perform their normal work assignments. While not specifically required for the job, other occupations on this list (such as Electrical Power-Line Installers and Repairers) may find potential employees with a CDL highly desirable candidates.

This program will collaborate with partners of relevant employers to verify the need for these workers and ensure that students have the required knowledge, skills, abilities, and certifications.

CIS- Degree & Certificate	Cyberpreneurship	<p>The Cyberpreneurship program is the culmination of 3 years of work funded by the NSF ATE. The program has been developed with the support and guidance of our Business and Industry Leadership Team made up of 30 local business owners, cybersecurity professionals and internship and apprenticeship partners and K-12 leaders. There is currently a huge gap in the cybersecurity labor market. There are currently 714,548 cyber jobs open in the US and 77,141 in California according to <a href="http://cyberseek.org">http://cyberseek.org</a>. This labor market information does not account for the small to mid-sized businesses that do not have the ability to have a full-time IT/Cyber employee. In fact, only 14% of small to mid-sized businesses have a cybersecurity employee yet 43% of all breaches in 2019 were at these businesses. Clearly, the security of these companies and the nation demands that we develop additional contract workers who can help these businesses secure their systems without incurring the cost of a full-time cyber team. Every business is impacted by cyber risk and is required by federal and state regulations and payment card standards to take steps to secure the data they process ex. Customer records, credit card information and data privacy policies. The Cyberpreneurship program will train individuals to become cybersecurity professionals. However, being a skilled cybersecurity professional does not mean an individual knows how to run a business. Therefore, through a cross discipline approach students in this program will also learn entrepreneurship skills such as how to create a business plan and build a business, manage finances, marketing, IT project management, and applicable cyber laws. The outcome will be individuals that work as independent contractors to help these small to mid-sized businesses manage their cybersecurity and reduce cybersecurity risks to the organization, their customers and the nation.</p>	M Moved to action items for RIV CC
