 - a. Chair Douglass explained that the public may comment on items not included on the agenda during the “Public Comments” agenda item only. Total time for public comments will be limited to 10 minutes. Time limits for each individual speaker will be 3 minutes, unless there are several speakers in which case time may be reduced to ensure public comment is limited to 10 minutes. Public comment is to be germane to the duties of the body, relate to current or new items for discussion and decision by the body, be respectful, and avoid the use of names or pejoratives. Curriculum committee members may not discuss, nor may they take action on public comments associated with items not on the agenda. If a Curriculum Committee Representative determines that the issue needs further discussion, the member may submit an agenda item dedicated to the issue at a subsequent meeting

 - i. The District assessment group created a process for assessing GESLO I and worked with other colleges Senate and Curriculum committees
 - ii. Would like to take revision 3.0 to Senate (colleges and then District).

- iii. Discussion of language regarding solving problems, noting from the committee that not all disciplines have definitive solutions to the problems they explore, and clarified the hope that this was a broad umbrella.
 - iv. Kruienga-Muro explained the charge was to clarify the language and NOT change the language.
 - v. Committee members noted their concern that not all of the language works for the arts and hope assessment committee more generally interpreted ILO language, but given that the charge did not allow changing the meaning of the ILO, we agreed it is clearer.

- i. Dr. Wright talked the committee through the attached PPT on CCN updates that include an updated timeline and its local work implications
 - ii. Phase I – RCCD has completed.
 - iii. Phase II – Part A and Part B
 - 1. Part A – colleges receive templates March 25; faculty launch September 2025; goes student facing Fall 26
 - 2. Part B – colleges receive templates May 25; faculty launch September 2026; goes student facing Fall 27
 - iv. Phase III – list is now 29 courses.
 - 1. New dates to be sent out when available, but for now appears to be colleges receive templates Feb. 26; faculty launch September 2026; goes student facing Fall 27
 - v. Discussion:

It is the committee members discretion as to how you are relaying committee information (fwd minutes; create a report from minutes with items relevant to only your department and include updates on where proposals are in the process; share via email and/or report at meetings – these are all great options.)
 1. Many initiatives happening that affect departments in new ways; important that departments get info and brief education on how the curriculum works and their role
 2. Please encourage your department colleagues to come to you with curriculum needs, and also remind them about our local handbook and the PCAH (Program and Course Approval Handbook from the state) that are both linked on our curriculum page on the college website.

 1. Stephen is working on updating videos; you should see a popup that directs you to instructional videos
 2. The interface looks different, but the information is all the same.
 3. If you run into issues, please take a screen shot of the issue and send to Steven
 - e. ASRCC Representative – Harley Glenn – not present; no report
 - f. Equity-Minded Curriculum (Contributions from Ahumada, Amidon, Haines, Merrill)
 - i. ESCALA training was eye-opening and beneficial. Others encouraged to participate.
 - ii. Students are going through a lot, specifically undocumented students. Encourage faculty to consider the role they play in the classroom and be mindful of the challenges facing students. There are a lot of resources available.
 - iii. Dance dept student concert (student led) are doing a collaboration concert, with other disciplines coming in. Will provide updates as available.

- iv. Regarding the wave of “bots” that has impacted some enrollments (essentially fake students that take up an enrollment space, primarily but not exclusively in online courses, but are actually bots designed around a fraud scheme): We have been warned and perhaps heard of a few cases with high numbers but concern over that seems to be spreading beyond the reach of the problem and creating issues for students. Be mindful and investigate before dropping or refusing readmission of a student

New Programs - ADT

The Associate in Science in Agriculture Plant Science for Transfer offers students a solid foundation in environmental horticulture, preparing them for advanced coursework in agriculture and environmental plant sciences. This program is specifically designed to facilitate a smooth transfer to California State University (CSU) within the agricultural science field, ensuring students can complete their bachelor's degree with guaranteed admission to a similar major at a CSU, entering with junior standing, and fulfilling remaining requirements within 60 semester or 90 quarter units.

Career opportunities in agriculture and plant sciences are abundant in California's expanding horticulture and agronomic sectors. Graduates in these fields are increasingly sought after as agriculture adopts more high-tech approaches and embraces sustainable practices. Pursuing a degree in Agriculture Plant Sciences can lead to careers in soil science and conservation, agricultural biology, entomology, plant biotechnology, postharvest physiology, and the environmental protection of water resources, farmlands, open spaces, and landscaped areas.

Program Discontinuance - ADT

Challenges faced by the journalism program since 2021, including declining enrollments and lack of interest from the student body and community, despite efforts to revitalize the program including collaboration with RCC, CTE and the Innovation Center. Based on all of the input and discussions by the program discontinuance task force, the determination was made to discontinue the journalism program. The Task Force also recommends that MVC looks for tangible ways to incorporate student voices through other disciplines, outreach, and marketing.

New Certificate

In alignment with RCCD Board Policy 5775, item 6 ("Encouragement of curriculum in environmental sustainability"), and the District Strategic Plan 2019-24, Objective 6.1 ("Establish and expand relationships with regional educational institutions"), Norco College proposes the introduction of a Biology Field Technician Certificate. A survey of local educational institutions revealed that there are no certificates of this type in our region. This certificate is structured to provide skills needed to assist professional Biologists in field work as a biology field technician. The selected courses will ensure that Norco College students are well-equipped for field work in the environment.

The Resolution of the Board of Governors, California Community Colleges (No. 2019-11), emphasizes the importance of prioritizing sustainability within the CCCs, including the provision of valuable education for our students. A recent report indicates that the global green technology and sustainability market is projected to grow from \$11.2 billion in 2020 to \$36.6 billion by 2025. Additionally, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics forecasts that more than half of the job growth expected by 2026 will occur in eco-friendly occupations. Offering a Biology Field Technician Certificate will equip our students with experience for rewarding careers and contribute to a more stable future.

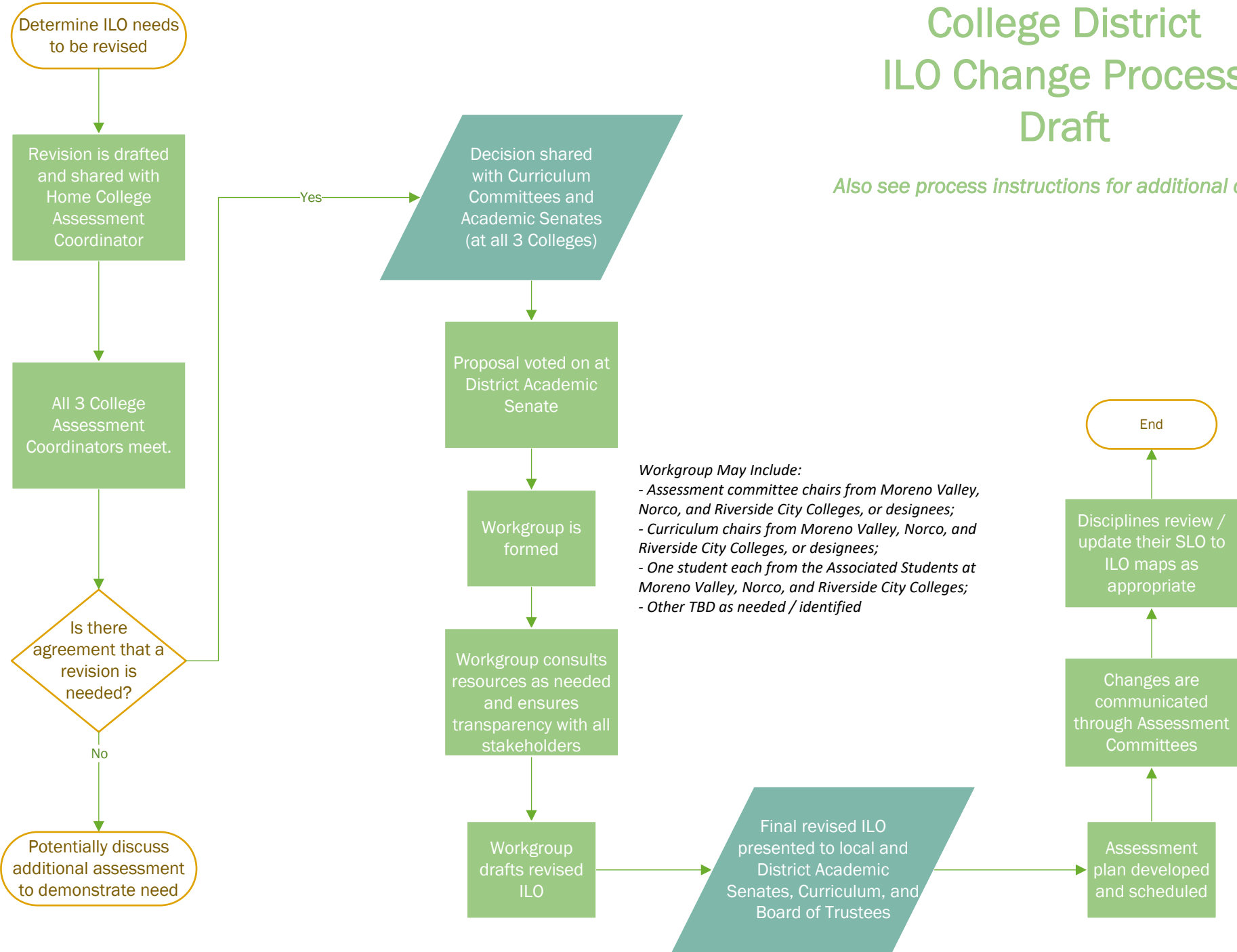
