The Chancellor shall establish procedures defining enrollment and registration priorities, limitations, and processes for student challenge, which shall comply with Title 5 regulations.

AP 3055 ENROLLMENT PRIORITIES

References:

Title 5 Sections 51006, 58106, and 58108
Education Code 66025.8

All courses and programs of the District shall be open to enrollment in accordance with Board Policy 3052, Open Enrollment, and a priority system consistent with Board Policy 3055 and this Procedure.

Students have the right to challenge any enrollment restriction in accordance with Policy 2260, titled Pre-Requisites, Co-Requisites and Advisories.

No student is required to confer or consult with or required to receive permission to enroll in any class offered by the District, except as provided for in Administrative Procedure 3052, titled Open Enrollment.

Students are not required to participate in any pre-registration activities not uniformly required, and no registration procedures are used that result in restricting enrollment to a specialized clientele.

Over-Subscribed Enrollment Priority

Once students satisfy the admissions criteria to over-subscribed programs, enrollment priority shall be determined according to the legal residence of applicants in the following order:

1. Residents of the Riverside Community College District who have completed a minimum of a 3 unit academic course in the Riverside Community College District.
2. Residents of the Riverside Community College District.
3. Residents of other community college districts within Riverside County which do not present similar courses or programs.
4. Residents of California community college districts outside Riverside County.
5. Residents of areas outside of California.

NOTE: Pursuant to legislation, Associate Degree in Nursing programs are exempt from non-evaluative selection criteria.

NUMBER OF ENROLLMENTS IN THE ADN (RN), VN, AND NATP PROGRAMS

1. In partnership with the Nursing Advisory Committee, the number of available enrollment spaces will be based on the college's and community's capacity to support the program, current labor-market needs, and shifts within the health care delivery system
2. The following numbers are used as a baseline for total program enrollments:
 - a. ADN (RN): 260
 - b. VN: 70
 - c. NATP: 480
3. Enrollment numbers may vary based on several factors, such as the availability of additional funding for expanded enrollment, pending approvals from BRN, BVNPT, and/or CDPH.

**ENROLLMENT PROCEDURE: NURSING ASSISTANT TRAINING PROGRAM
(NATP)**

1. All interested students are encouraged to attend a Pre-Nursing Information Workshop offered through School of Nursing (SON) and meet with a Nursing/Health-Related Sciences Counselor and/or Educational Resource Advisor, Nursing.
2. Submit an application to the [RCC](#). Applicants must maintain a current RCC application on file while awaiting admission to the SON.
3. Prospective students can obtain an application online and submit the completed application to the SON during the specified Application Period.
4. Admission is based on a first come, first serve basis upon the completion and submission of the pre-program checklist to the Program Specialist, Nursing as outlined on the *NATP Information Sheet*.
5. Notification of admission will be sent to qualified applicants according to the admission procedures and spaces available.
6. Once accepted to the SON, it is the applicant's responsibility to accept or decline their space by the designated deadline. Applicants who do not respond by the deadline will forfeit their admission to the SON.
7. Any student who declines a space will be required to resubmit an application for admission during the next application filing period.

CALCULATION OF GPA/POINTS

GPA and point calculations for repeated courses will be congruent with Riverside Community College District policy (*BP/AP 2225/2230: Course Repetition & Grading and Academic Record Symbols*). In order to comply with RCC's graduation requirements, clarification for applicants to the School of Nursing is as follows:

1. A student who has earned three "D" or "F" grades in a non-nursing course that is required for the nursing program must repeat an equivalent course at another school to earn a passing (minimum "C") grade. Course equivalency is determined by the involved discipline.
2. A student who has earned a "C" grade in a non-nursing course and wishes to repeat the course to earn a higher grade may submit a *Course Repetition* form to Admissions and Records. If the student subsequently earns a higher grade in the course, the higher grade will be used to compute grade point average or points.

PREREQUISITE COURSES IN PROGRESS

1. If the prerequisite course is in progress outside of RCCD, validation of enrollment and progress must be submitted to the Program Specialist, Nursing.
2. As soon as the in progress prerequisite course is completed, the final grade must be submitted to the Program Specialist, Nursing as soon as its available.
3. Applicants with courses in progress will have lower priority than those applicants whose prerequisite courses are complete by the end of the application period.

RANKING TIED APPLICANTS

When two or more applicants receive the same ranking for admission or readmission into the ADN (RN) or VN programs, the following procedures will be used to break the tie:

1. Admission Applicants:

- A random selection process will be used to determine ranking.

2. Readmission Applicants:

- a. Refer to the *Prioritization of Readmission* policy for guidance.
- b. If two or more students have the same theory grade, a random selection process will be used to break the tie.

REQUIREMENT FOR HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION OR EQUIVALENT

In order to be eligible for the NCLEX, both California boards which regulate nursing practice require evidence of completion of high school or equivalent. Documentation of this requirement must be on file by the application deadline in order for an applicant to be considered for acceptance to the VN or 30-unit Option RN programs. An official transcript (not a diploma) is required by RCC.

The California Department of Public Health requires evidence of the criteria listed below to be eligible to be admitted to the program and take the state licensing exam upon successful completion of the course.

Traditional ADN (RN) program applicants must submit College Board transcripts by the application deadline to verify a score of a 3, 4, or on the AP Chemistry exam taken in high school, if applicable, by the application deadline.

1. Board of Vocational Nursing and Psychiatric Technicians requires proof completion of a general education course of study through the 12th grade or evidence of completion of the equivalent thereof (diploma or GED). Equivalency is determined by the Department of education in any of the United States or by a national-recognized regional accrediting body (*2530 General Requirements, BVNPT*)
2. Board of Registered Nursing (BRN) will accept one of the documents as specified in section *1412* of the BRN Nursing Practice Act with Rules and Regulations (see below).

1412. High School Education or the Equivalent

An applicant must meet the general preliminary education requirement of a high school education in the United States or the equivalent. Upon request of the Board, an applicant shall provide evidence of education equivalent to completion of a high school course of study in the United States by submitting one of the following:

- (a) A high school diploma received from a U.S. high school.
 - (b) A General Education Development certificate.
 - (c) A degree from any junior college, college or university accredited by a state agency authorized to accredit such institutions.
 - (d) An evaluation by a high school, unified school district, junior college, college, university or board of education which the board determines, after review, establishes that an education equivalent to a high school education in the United States was obtained in this or another state or in any foreign country.
3. California Department of Public Health requires the following for the Nursing Assistant Training Program:
 - (a) Be at least sixteen (16) years of age.
 - (b) Criminal record clearance.

ENROLLMENT INTEGRITY POLICY

This policy applies to any instance in which a student fails to fully disclose, or provides incomplete or inaccurate disclosure of, required enrollment information — including attendance at any previous nursing programs. Failure to report such information at any time during enrollment in the School of Nursing constitutes a violation of enrollment integrity and may result in dismissal from the program without eligibility for readmission.

**POLICY FOR STUDENTS TRANSFERRING FROM ANOTHER NURSING
PROGRAM**

Students attempting to transfer from another nursing program must meet all admission and prerequisite requirements as listed on the *RCC ADN (RN) or VN Information Sheets*.

Students transferring from another nursing program must submit the following to the RCC School of Nursing (SON):

- a. Formal letter or email sent directly to the Dean, School of Nursing from the Director of the nursing program the student is transferring from. The letter must address the following areas concerning the student's standing in the program:
 - i. Academic Standing – a statement of the student's current academic standing within the program.
 - ii. Clinical Performance – a summary of the student's clinical performance and any clinical safety issues must be noted.
 - iii. Readmission Status – confirmation or declination of whether the student has readmission privileges.
- b. Official *Up-to-Date* transcripts (within 90-days) from prior nursing program.
- c. Course outlines and syllabi from completed nursing courses.

ADN (RN) NURSING COURSE CHALLENGE POLICY

All ADN (RN) courses may be challenged in accordance with the *RCC Credit for College Level Examination Program* policy. The review of education and experience will be completed by semester-level faculty and the Nursing Enrollment Committee. The individualized testing procedure will be determined by the semester-level faculty. The testing procedure shall include successful theory performance on the semester final exam as well as demonstrated competence of selected clinical skills.

The policy for LVN or Non-Nursing Healthcare Professionals Advanced Placement Examination(s) covering the first year is outlined in the *ADN (RN) Advanced Placement/Transfer/30-Unit Option Information Sheet* and *Non-Nursing Healthcare Professional Information Sheet*. Any student who has successfully passed the Advanced Placement Exam(s) may be offered a spacing in Nursing 12 or 21 in the ADN (RN), pending space availability, transcript review, and healthcare experience.

A student seeking enrollment into the ADN (RN) program, who has analogous educational experience, may be granted the opportunity to challenge specific nursing coursework as it relates to their respective educational/experiential background (i.e., Certified Nursing Assistants, Licensed Vocational Nurses, Licensed Psychiatric Technicians, Paramedics, Anesthesia Technologists, and Military Corpsman).

1. Each transfer applicant will be evaluated on an individual basis.
2. Testing to demonstrate theory/clinical competency may be required. In this event, the student will receive information related to the course student learning outcomes to be tested.
3. All prerequisite coursework identified in the RCC College Catalog must be completed within GPA requirements before transfer credit will be considered.
4. A minimum grade of “C” will be required in all nursing coursework in order to be considered for transfer credit.

**POLICY & PROCEDURE: CHALLENGE/ADVANCED PLACEMENT FOR
MILITARY-TRAINED HEALTHCARE PERSONNEL**

Applicants with documented relevant military education and experience may be eligible to achieve advanced placement (AP) into the associate degree (ADN) registered nursing (RN) program. After transcript evaluation, eligible applicants will be given the opportunity to pass individualized challenge exam, skills competency, and dosage calculation exam(s), in compliance with the Board of Registered Nursing (BRN) regulation in *Division 14 of Title 16 of the California Code of Regulations, Section 1418: Eligibility for Licensure of Applicants who have Military Education and Experience*.

Policy:

1. Applicants must meet all general entrance requirements of the associate degree RN program, including completion of the designated prerequisites.
2. Applicants must pass individualized challenge exam(s) with a score of 75% or better.
3. Applicants who are eligible for second year placement (Army 68WM6 LPN or equivalent) must successfully complete NRN-18/18B or NRN-19/19B prior to entering the program.
4. Applicants entering NRN-11 are not required to complete NRN-18/18B or NRN-19/19B prior to entering the program.
5. Acceptance of military challenge students into the associate degree RN program is contingent upon space availability.
6. Military challenge students who are unable to pass the challenge exam(s), skill competency assessment and/or dosage calculation assessment for advanced placement may remediate and repeat the challenge exam(s), skill competency assessment, and/or the dosage calculation assessment. If the student is unsuccessful after the second attempt on any of these assessment measures, the student may take the Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) and upon successfully passing the TEAS, the student would gain priority enrollment into NRN-11 based on space availability.

Procedure:

Interested candidates must request an appointment with the Program Specialist, Nursing at least four weeks prior to the application period to discuss eligibility requirements for the associate degree RN program.

1. Applicants who may be eligible for advanced placement include those individuals who have satisfactory completed relevant military education and experience.

2. Applicants applying for transfer credit to the associate degree RN program must submit the following materials verifying education and experience:
 - a. Transcripts from appropriate education program(s), demonstrating satisfactory completion of relevant coursework and clinical experience
 - b. Course outlines for relevant courses may be requested for accurate evaluation
 - c. Documentation of relevant experience
3. After an individualized assessment and review of the applicant's documentation/transcripts and upon determination that the applicant has met the educational and experiential requirements for advanced placement into the associate degree RN program, including the additional nursing program admission requirements, the student will be invited to take an individualized challenge exam(s), a skills competency assessment, and a dosage calculation competency assessment.
4. The content of the challenge exam(s) will be based upon content expert faculty review and evaluation of the applicant's specific military education and experience and its evidence of meeting, in whole or in part, the BRN minimum standards of competency and education requirements for RN licensure (*BRN California Code of Regulations, Section 1426(c)[1-3]*).
5. Advanced placement will be granted if the applicant meets minimum requirements and successfully passing required exams. Admission is based on space availability.

Program Overview

The Associate of Science Degree (ADN) in Registered Nursing (RN) requires four semesters, excluding the completion of prerequisite courses.

Upon completion of the 71-unit program, the graduate earns an ADN (RN) and is eligible to apply for the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN) for licensure as a Registered Nurse in the State of California.

Enrollment

Each Spring and Fall semester, 44-100 traditional candidates are accepted into the ADN (RN) program. Those applicants who are not accepted must reapply the following semester. There is no wait list.

Application to the School of Nursing

Students applying to the School of Nursing (SON) must have all eligibility and prerequisite requirements completed or in progress at the time of application. Completion of general education courses prior to program admission is encouraged.

The applicant is responsible for ensuring that **ALL** official up-to-date transcripts and other necessary documentation have been received by Riverside City College (RCC) at the time of application.

- Admission will be denied to an applicant who earned a grade of "C-" or less in a nursing program at another college.
- Foreign transcripts must have a Detailed Evaluation and must be submitted by the application deadline. Information can be obtained from the Counseling Office.
- Students must have applied to RCC prior to applying to the ADN (RN) program.
- Meeting minimum requirements of the program does not guarantee admission into the program.

Application Filing Period

- **SPRING SEMESTER** - Application filing period between first business day of June to first business day of July.
- **FALL SEMESTER** - Application filing period between first business day of October to first business day of November.
- **PETITIONING STUDENTS:** (Students applying for readmission or for transfer): Year-round.

Requirements for Eligibility and Prerequisite Courses:

1. Complete an RCC application on CCCApply and be eligible to attend RCC.
2. Cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 in all course work attempted at RCC and a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or greater, which includes all accredited college units attempted.
3. A minimum GPA of at least 2.5 in all general education courses is required to earn an ADN (RN) degree.
4. Prerequisite Courses (15 units):
 - a. Minimum GPA of 2.5 in the following science prerequisite courses:
 - i. Biology 50A (4 units)
 - ii. Biology 50B (4 units)
 - iii. Biology 55 (4 units)
 - b. Completion of Psychology 9 (3 units, Birth to Death) with a grade of "C" or better.
5. The *Test for Essential Academic Skills* (ATI TEAS – TEAS 7) is required for all applicants applying for the ADN (RN) program. See the *RCC SON TEAS Test policy* in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* for detailed information.

Meeting minimum eligibility criteria for the program does not guarantee admission to the program.

Anatomy and Physiology Requirement

RCC encourages students to complete the entire series of Anatomy and Physiology at one school. This is due to the concern of possible missing components in curriculum when completed at separate colleges. Nursing applicants that have taken Anatomy and Physiology at two separate colleges are required to receive approval for these courses by requesting a *Request for Equivalencies and Substitutions* form from the Counseling or Evaluations departments.

Selection Procedure

Available enrollment spaces are selected by rank order (highest points) based on points earned on the multicriteria factors and through random selection (see *Enrollment Criteria for 1st Semester Traditional ADN (RN) Students* attached). RCC reserves the right to designate a certain number of enrollment spaces for contract agreements and/or to meet requirements grant-designated outcomes.

Applicants with a regionally accredited bachelor's degree from the United States (US) will be waived from completing the 6 general education courses, but must:

- have taken the science prerequisites
- satisfy the Statistics (STAT C1000/C1000H, formerly MAT-12/12H, or PSYC/SOC-48) and PSYC-9 requirements
- have taken courses in English Composition, Communication, and Sociology/Cultural Anthropology

Students must pass the *ATI Test for Essential Academic Skills* (ATI TEAS – TEAS 7) prior to program enrollment. Please see the *RCC SON TEAS Test policy* in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* for the full policy.

- Applicants must earn a minimum score of 62 on the TEAS to be eligible for enrollment in the ADN (RN) program. A student may re-take the TEAS every 365 days to improve their score.
- Applicants will be required to attach their **unofficial** TEAS transcript from ATI when completing the application for the ADN (RN) program.
 - In addition, **official** TEAS transcripts must be submitted electronically to RCC via ATI (www.atitesting.com).
 - ATI charges a transcript fee for the TEAS official transcript.
 - Use the code RIVERSIDE CC ADN when sending the official TEAS transcript from ATI (www.atitesting.com).
- Applicants who have not met the minimum passing score of 62 on the first attempt, will be referred to the Nursing Counselor to develop a remediation plan in the respective areas of English, Reading, Mathematics, and/or Science.
 - The length of this remediation shall be approximately twelve (12) months, depending on each student's identified area(s) of difficulty.
 - Students must provide verification of completion of their remediation to the Nursing Counselor.

For specific information regarding the SON selection criteria, please see the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual*. If a student is not offered a space in the program, a new application is necessary in the next application period. The SON has no wait list.

Transcript Requirements

Transcripts are *Official* when they are sent directly to RCC from the sending institution or are hand-delivered by the student in a sealed envelope from the sending institution. Copies of transcripts/diplomas not accepted. Transcripts are *Up-to-Date* when they

are received by RCC no more than 90 days after the sending institution issued them, as verified by the date that the institution stamps on the transcript.

If you need to request an official copy of your transcripts from other colleges previously attended, please visit the [Parchment](#) website. Transcripts that are not official and not considered *Up-to-Date* will be returned to the student and will result in a lower priority status. Please be aware that your transcripts will be purged after one year if you have never been enrolled at RCC, or if you have not been an RCC student for four years.

Additional General Education Requirements (20 units)

The following general education courses are not required for admission to the ADN (RN) program; rather, they are required for the completion of the ADN (RN) degree. Most students complete these requirements before entering the ADN (RN) program due to the rigorous course load. Technology Requirements

Students must have access to an Apple iPad that supports iOS 24 or above. Students do have the option to participate in the SON iPad Loaner program if they are unable to purchase an iPad, as funding is available. A desktop or laptop computer (Windows or macOS) is optional. Students must have Wi-Fi capability and reliable broadband internet. Upon admission, students will be provided with program-specific digital platforms that will need to be either accessed or purchased. Please see the *Technology Requirement* policy in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* or *ADN (RN) Student Handbook* for detailed information.

Recommended Electives During Program

It is highly recommended that all nursing students enroll in a Nursing Learning Lab (B and/or C course) each semester. These electives provide opportunities for additional self-paced practice and mastery of nursing skills. Instructional guidance and computer assisted materials which support semester student learning outcomes are also available.

Expenses (per year)

- Students pay Health Services Fees (\$50), parking (\$150), Student Services Fees (\$30) and tuition (\$46) per unit each semester.
- Students furnish their own uniforms. The cost is approximately \$250.
- The costs of nursing books, supply bag, iPad, testing platform and other required learning resources are approximately \$2,500 for two years.
- Physical examination/lab work costs are approximately \$98 - \$600.
- Background checks/CPR costs approximately \$220.
- It is recommended that students carry personal health and accident insurance including hospitalization. Policies are available to college students at reasonable rates. The college provides liability insurance at no cost to the student.
- Students are required to purchase standardized testing package for use during the program. Estimated cost is \$1,600.
- The cost is approximately \$7,500 for four semesters.

When planning expenses, students should be aware they may have to limit their hours of employment due to the rigor required for the ADN (RN) program. Scholarships and grants are available to those students who qualify.

Other Requirements

Health Examination and CPR Certification

Students will be admitted to the program pending submission of a CPR card (American Heart Association BLS Healthcare Provider Course) that is valid for 2 years, required immunizations, and a completed health examination form with clearance permitting unrestricted functional abilities essential to nursing practice in accordance with the American with Disabilities Act (1990). A completed immunization record, health examination, and CPR certification are not required at the time of application.

Background Check/Drug Screen

All new and readmitting students are required to demonstrate a clear background check and drug screen prior to enrollment in the ADN (RN) program. See the *Background Check/Drug Screen* policy in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* for further details. The background check requires that students be able to provide a valid social security number or Individual Taxpayer Identification (ITIN) number. The process for obtaining the background check is available in the School of Nursing office.

California Board of Registered Nursing Legal Limitation of Licensure: Misdemeanors/Felony Notification

Graduates of the ADN (RN) program are eligible to apply for the NCLEX-RN licensure exam. This requires that applicants submit fingerprints and report any prior conviction or any offense other than minor traffic violations. Failure to report such convictions can be grounds for denial of licensure. The BRN investigates convictions by obtaining information on the underlying facts of the case, dates and disposition of the case, and subsequent rehabilitation.

Disclosure of Social Security Number/ Individual Taxpayer Identification (ITIN) number

Disclosure of one's social security number or ITIN is mandatory for licensure by the BRN in accordance with Section 30 of the Business and Professions Code and Public Law 94-455 (42USCA 405 (c)(2)(C)).

Fingerprint Requirement

Applicants for licensure are required to be fingerprinted for purposes of conducting a criminal history record check. The fingerprints remain on file with the California Department of Justice, and that agency provides reports to the Board of any future convictions on an ongoing basis. (Authority: Section 144, Business and Professions Code).

The CEP program is a 2 ½ - 3-year (full-time) program for qualified applicants who choose to participate and have met all CSU general education requirements prior to applying to the ADN (RN) program. Upon completion, the RCC ADN (RN) graduate earns an Associate of Science Degree in Nursing and is eligible to apply for the NCLEX-RN licensing exam as a Registered Nurse in the State of California.

1. Complete a RCC ADN (RN) application and indicate on the application your interest in participating in the *RCC-CSU Concurrent Enrollment Program*.
2. Complete all RCC and CSU/CalGETC prerequisites and lower division GE requirements (see *CEP Program Map*).
3. Verify with the RCC SON Office for validation that prior coursework meets CSU/CalGETC general education requirements for fulfilling lower division categories.
4. Meet the overall minimum GPA of 2.75 in all RCC nursing preadmission required courses and an overall cumulative GPA of 2.75.
5. Maintain a 2.0 grade point average in all coursework while enrolled in the CEP program.
6. Attend a *Pre-Nursing Information Workshop*.
7. Complete the *Test for Essential Academic Skills (ATI TEAS-TEAS 7)* which is required for all applicants to the ADN (RN) program. Please see the *RCC SON TEAS Test policy* in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* for detailed information.

Meeting minimum eligibility criteria for the program does not guarantee admission to the program.

Anatomy and Physiology Requirement

RCC encourages students to complete the entire series of Anatomy and Physiology at one school. This is due to the concern of possible missing components in the curriculum when completed at separate colleges. Nursing applicants that have taken Anatomy and Physiology at two separate colleges are required to receive approval for these courses by requesting a *Request for Equivalencies and Substitutions* form from the Counseling or Evaluations departments.

Selection Procedure

Available enrollment spaces are selected by rank order (highest points) based on points earned on the multicriteria factors and through random selection (see *Enrollment Criteria for RCC-CSU Concurrent Enrollment Program* attached). RCC reserves the right to designate a certain number of enrollment spaces for contract agreements and/or to meet requirements grant-designated outcomes. Applicants with a regionally accredited bachelor's degree from the United States (US) will be waived from completing the 6 general education courses, but must:

- have taken the science prerequisites
- satisfy the Statistics (STAT C1000/C1000H, formerly MAT-12/12H, or PSYC/SOC-48) and PSYC-9 requirements
- have taken courses in English Composition, Communication and Sociology/Cultural Anthropology

Students must pass the *ATI Test for Essential Academic Skills (ATI TEAS – TEAS 7)* prior to program enrollment. Please see the *RCC SON TEAS Test policy* in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* for the full policy.

- Applicants must earn a minimum score of 62 on the TEAS to be eligible for enrollment in the ADN (RN) program. A student may re-take the TEAS every 365 days to improve their score.
- Applicants will be required to attach their **unofficial** TEAS transcript from ATI when completing the application for the ADN (RN) program. In addition, **official** TEAS transcripts must be submitted electronically to RCC via ATI (www.atitesting.com). ATI charges a transcript fee for the TEAS official transcript. Use the code RIVERSIDE CC ADN when sending the official TEAS transcript from ATI (www.atitesting.com).
- Applicants who have not met the minimum passing score of 62 on the first attempt, will be referred to the Nursing Counselor to develop a remediation plan in the respective areas of English, Reading, Mathematics, and/or Science.
 - The length of this remediation shall be approximately twelve (12) months, depending on each student's identified area(s) of difficulty.
 - Students must provide verification of completion of their remediation to the Nursing Counselor.

For specific information regarding the SON selection criteria, please see the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual*. If a student is not offered a space in the program, a new application is necessary in the next application period. The SON has no wait list.

Transcript Requirements

Transcripts are *Official* when they are sent directly to RCC from the sending institution or are hand-delivered by the student in a sealed envelope from the sending institution. Copies of transcripts/diplomas not accepted. Transcripts are *Up-to-Date* when they are received by RCC no more than 90 days after the sending institution issued them, as verified by the date that the institution stamps on the transcript.

- Students pay RCC Health Services Fees (\$50), parking (\$150), Student Services Fees (\$30) and tuition (\$46) per unit each semester.
- Students furnish their own uniforms. The cost is approximately \$250.
- The costs of nursing books, supply bag, iPad, testing platform and other required learning resources are approximately \$2,500 for two years.
- Physical examination/lab work costs are approximately \$98 - \$600.
- Background checks/CPR costs approximately \$220.
- It is recommended that students carry personal health and accident insurance including hospitalization. Policies are available to college students at reasonable rates. The college provides liability insurance at no cost to the student.
- Students are required to purchase standardized testing package for use during the program. Estimated cost is \$1,600.
- The cost is approximately \$7,500 for four semesters.

When planning expenses, students should be aware they may have to limit their hours of employment due to the rigor required for the ADN (RN) program. Scholarships and grants are available to those students who qualify.

Other Requirements

Health Examination and CPR Certification

Students will be admitted to the program pending submission of a CPR card (American Heart Association BLS Healthcare Provider Course) that is valid for 2 years, required immunizations, and a completed health examination form with clearance permitting unrestricted functional abilities essential to nursing practice in accordance with the American with Disabilities Act (1990). A completed immunization record, health examination, and CPR certification are not required at the time of application.

Background Check/Drug Screen

All new and readmitting students are required to demonstrate a clear background check and drug screen prior to enrollment in the ADN (RN) program. See the *Background Check/Drug Screen* policy in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* for further details. The background check requires that students be able to provide a valid social security or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) number. The process for obtaining the background check is available in the School of Nursing office.

California Board of Registered Nursing Legal Limitation of Licensure: Misdemeanors/Felony Notification

Graduates of the ADN (RN) program are eligible to apply for the NCLEX-RN licensure exam. This requires that applicants submit fingerprints and report any prior conviction or any offense other than minor traffic violations. Failure to report such convictions can be grounds for denial of licensure. The BRN investigates convictions by obtaining information on the underlying facts of the case, dates and disposition of the case, and subsequent rehabilitation.

Disclosure of Social Security Number/ Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN)

Disclosure of one's social security or ITIN number is mandatory for licensure by the BRN in accordance with Section 30 of the Business and Professions Code and Public Law 94-455 (42USCA 405 (c)(2)(C)).

Fingerprint Requirement

Applicants for licensure are required to be fingerprinted for purposes of conducting a criminal history record check. The fingerprints remain on file with the California Department of Justice, and that agency provides reports to the Board of any future convictions on an ongoing basis. Advanced Placement, Transfer, and 30-Unit Option

Each Spring and Fall, Advanced Placement/Transfer/30-Unit Option students are accepted into the program based on a designated number of enrollment slots. Advanced Placement/Transfer is defined as entering the program at a level beyond the first semester of the ADN (RN) program.

Applicants who qualify for this option include:

- LVNs and students with successful experience in an ADN (RN) or Vocational Nursing program
- Applicants with military health care experience may qualify for the Advanced Placement option after their experience and related course work is evaluated

LVN-to-ADN (RN) FLEXible (FLEX) Option

When offered, the LVN to ADN (RN) FLEXible (FLEX) option is an alternate advanced placement pathway in the School of Nursing (SON). This program is identical to the traditional Advanced Placement option but offers the lectures/seminars in an online synchronous format that may be accessed from any computer with internet capability. Applicants may apply to both the Advanced Placement and/or FLEXible option(s). Preference is given to LVNs who work in community partner facilities and/or meet grant specific requirements.

Advanced Placement and Transfer Requirements

All Advanced Placement/Transfer students are required to complete Nursing 18 (NRN-18) and Nursing 18B (NRN-18B) prior to being considered for admission into the ADN (RN) program. The LVN 30-unit option candidate is exempt from the NRN-18/18B requirement. However, enrollment in NRN-18/18B is highly recommended.

- Equivalent education/experience in nursing, military experience, and/or health-related programs will be evaluated.
- LVNs must submit a copy of their current *Active*, unrestricted LVN license to the Nursing Enrollment and Evaluation Specialist at the time of application.
- Students transferring from another nursing program must submit the following to the Nursing Enrollment and Evaluation Specialist:
 - Official up-to-date transcript(s) (within 90 days) from prior nursing program.
 - Course outlines and syllabi from completed nursing courses.
 - Completion of the *Recommendation Form*. The form can be obtained from the Nursing Enrollment and Evaluations Specialist.
 - Personal letter describing reasons for wanting to transfer to this program.
- Congruent with BRN policy, if all requirements for the associate degree have been completed, LVN applicants for advanced placement in the ADN (RN) program are ineligible for the 30-unit option. These individuals must be admitted as candidates for the ADN (RN) degree program and must therefore, progress through the program as such.

The applicant is responsible for ensuring that **ALL** official up-to-date transcripts and other necessary documentation have been received by Riverside City College (RCC) at the time of application.

- Admission will be denied to an applicant who earned a grade of “C-” or less in a nursing program at another college.
- Foreign transcripts must have a *Detailed Evaluation* and must be submitted by the application deadline. Information can be obtained from the Counseling Office.

Technology Requirements

Students must have access to an Apple iPad that supports iOS 24 or above. Students do have the option to participate in the SON iPad Loaner program if they are unable to purchase an iPad, as funding is available. A desktop or laptop computer (Windows or macOS) is optional. Students must have Wi-Fi capability and reliable broadband internet. Upon admission, students will be provided with program-specific digital platforms that will need to be either accessed or purchased. Please see the *Technology Requirement* policy in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* or *ADN (RN) Student Handbook* for detailed information.

Recommended Electives During Program

It is highly recommended that all nursing students enroll in a Nursing Learning Lab (B and/or C course) each semester. These electives provide opportunities for additional self-paced practice and mastery of nursing skills. Instructional guidance and computer assisted materials which support semester student learning outcomes are also available.

Expenses (per year)

- Students pay Health Services fees (\$50), parking (\$150), Student Services fees (\$30) and tuition (\$46) per unit each semester.
- Students furnish their own uniforms. The cost is approximately \$250.
- The costs of nursing books, supply bag, iPad, testing platform and other required resources are approximately \$2,500.
- Physical examination/lab work costs are approximately \$98 - \$600.
- Background checks/CPR costs approximately \$220.
- Students are required to purchase standardized testing package for use during the program. Estimated cost is \$1,200.

- It is recommended that students carry personal health and accident insurance including hospitalization. Policies are available to college students at reasonable rates. The college provides liability insurance at no cost to the student.
- Total cost is approximately \$6,000 for two semesters.

When planning expenses, students should be aware they may have to limit their hours of employment due to the rigor required for the ADN (RN) program. Scholarships and grants are available to those students who qualify.

Other Requirements

Health Examination and CPR Certification

Students will be admitted to the program pending submission of a CPR card (American Heart Association BLS Healthcare Provider Course) that is valid for 2 years, required immunizations, and a completed health examination form with clearance permitting unrestricted functional abilities essential to nursing practice in accordance with the American with Disabilities Act (1990). A completed immunization record, health examination, and CPR certification are not required at the time of application.

Background Check/Drug Screen

All new and readmitting students are required to demonstrate a clear background check and drug screen prior to enrollment in the ADN (RN) program. See the *Background Check/Drug Screen* policy in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* for further details. The background check requires that students be able to provide a valid social security number or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN). The process for obtaining the background check is available in the School of Nursing office.

California Board of Registered Nursing Legal Limitation of Licensure: Misdemeanors/Felony Notification

Graduates of the ADN (RN) program are eligible to apply for the NCLEX-RN licensure exam. This requires that applicants submit fingerprints and report any prior conviction or any offense other than minor traffic violations. Failure to report such convictions can be grounds for denial of licensure. The BRN investigates convictions by obtaining information on the underlying facts of the case, dates, and disposition of the case, and subsequent rehabilitation.

Disclosure of Social Security Number/Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN)

Disclosure of one's social security number or ITIN is mandatory for licensure by the BRN in accordance with Section 30 of the Business and Professions Code and Public Law 94-455 (42USCA 405 (c)(2)(C)).

Fingerprint Requirement

Applicants for licensure are required to be fingerprinted for purposes of conducting a criminal history record check. The fingerprints remain on file with the California Department of Justice, and that agency provides reports to the Board of any future convictions on an ongoing basis. (Authority: Section 144, Business and Professions Code).

Admission Requirements

Non-Nursing Healthcare Professional Requirements

All Non-Nursing Healthcare Professional Advanced Placement students are required to complete Nursing 19 (NRN-19) and Nursing 19B (NRN-19B) prior to being considered for admission into the ADN (RN) program.

- Equivalent education/experience in nursing, military experience, and/or health-related programs will be evaluated.
- Non-Nursing healthcare professionals must submit a copy of their current *Active*, unrestricted license or certification to the Program Specialist at the time of application.

Application to the School of Nursing

Students applying to the School of Nursing (SON) must have all eligibility and prerequisite requirements a listed on the RCC *ADN (RN) Information Sheet*; however, the minimum GPA in the science prerequisite courses is a 2.3. Completion of general education courses prior to program admission is encouraged.

The applicant is responsible for ensuring that **ALL** official up-to-date transcripts and other necessary documentation have been received by Riverside City College (RCC) at the time of application.

- Foreign transcripts must have a *Detailed Evaluation* and must be submitted by the application deadline. Information can be obtained from the Counseling Office.
- Students with prerequisite courses in progress must turn in a grade verification form to the SON office as soon as the final grade is available.
- Students must have applied to RCC prior to applying to the ADN (RN) program.
- Meeting minimum requirements of the program does not guarantee admission into the program.

Application Filing Period

Requirements for Eligibility and Prerequisite Courses:

1. Complete an RCC application on CCCApply and be eligible to attend RCC.
2. Cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 in all course work attempted at RCC and a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or greater, which includes all accredited college units attempted.
3. Minimum GPA of at least 2.5 in all general education courses is required for to earn an ADN (RN) degree.
4. **Prerequisite Courses (19.5 units):**
 - a. Minimum GPA of 2.3 in the following science prerequisite courses:
 - i. Biology 50A (4 units)
 - ii. Biology 50B (4 units)
 - iii. Biology 55 (4 units)

Anatomy and Physiology Requirement

RCC encourages students to complete the entire series of Anatomy and Physiology at one school. This is due to the concern of possible missing components in curriculum when completed at separate colleges. Nursing applicants that have taken Anatomy and Physiology at two separate colleges are required to receive approval for these courses by requesting a *Request for Equivalencies and Substitutions* form from the Counseling or Evaluations departments.

Selection Procedure

Available enrollment spaces are selected by rank order (highest points) based on points earned on the multicriteria factors and through random selection (see *Enrollment Criteria for Non-Nursing Healthcare Professional Advanced Placement Students* attached). RCC reserves the right to designate a certain number of enrollment spaces for contract agreements and/or to meet requirements grant-designated outcomes.

Applicants with a regionally accredited bachelor’s degree from the United States (US) will be waived from completing the 6 general education courses, but must have:

- taken the science prerequisites
- Satisfied the Statistics requirement (STAT C1000/C1000H, formerly MAT-12/12H, or PSYC/SOC-48)
- Satisfied the PSYC-9 requirements
- Taken courses in English Composition, Communication, and Sociology/Cultural Anthropology.

RCC HESI Advanced Placement Exam(s) Information

- Students must provide proof of licensure as an LVN to be eligible to take the exam.
- The Advanced Placement Exam(s) is provided to comply with *BRN Rules and Regulations, Section 2786.6, Regulation Concerning Credit*. It is offered twice a year. Please check with the SON for specific dates.
- The minimum passing score is 75%, which has been established by the SON. No rounding of scores will occur, per program policy.
- For study purposes, information will be available in NRN-18.
- If a passing score is earned on the *RCC HESI Advanced Placement Exam(s)*, the non-nursing healthcare professional is eligible for acceptance to Nursing 12 or 21, pending space available and completion of minimum requirements for eligibility, review of transcripts, and prior healthcare experience.
- The *RCC HESI Advanced Placement Exam(s)* must be paid for 3 weeks prior to the exam via the Evolve website. You must show proof of payment to be eligible to take the exam.

- Students applying for Advanced Placement have 2 attempts to pass the *RCC HESI Advanced Placement Exam*. If the student does not pass after the second attempt, the student must apply for Nursing 11 in the ADN (RN) program.

Skill Competency

- Should the non-nursing healthcare professional accept advanced placement in Nursing 12 or 21, the student is responsible for all knowledge and skills from previous semesters of the RCC ADN (RN) program. Please see *Nursing Skills Across the Curriculum*.
- Any skills related to the registered nursing scope of practice will be taught in NRN-19, including:
 - Venipuncture
 - Intravenous insertion
 - Administration of intravenous medications (IV push, IVPB, and primary IV fluids)
 - Blood product administration
 - Management of PCA infusion
 - Central line dressing changes
- Skill competency will be assessed during NRN-19B and must be passed with a *Satisfactory* to be considered for Advanced Placement admission.

Transcript Requirements

- The costs of nursing books, supply bag, iPad, testing platform and other required resources are approximately \$2,500.
- Physical examination/lab work costs are approximately \$98 - \$600.
- Background checks/CPR costs approximately \$220.
- Students are required to purchase standardized testing package for use during the program. Estimated cost is \$1,200.
- It is recommended that students carry personal health and accident insurance including hospitalization. Policies are available to college students at reasonable rates. The college provides liability insurance at no cost to the student.
- Total cost is approximately \$6,700 for three semesters.

When planning expenses, students should be aware they may have to limit their hours of employment due to the rigor required for the ADN (RN) program. Scholarships and grants are available to those students who qualify.

Other Requirements

Health Exam and CPR Certification

Students will be admitted to the program pending submission of a CPR card (American Heart Association BLS Healthcare Provider Course) that is valid for 2 years, required immunizations, and a completed health examination form with clearance permitting unrestricted functional abilities essential to nursing practice in accordance with the American with Disabilities Act (1990). A completed immunization record, health examination, and CPR certification are not required at the time of application.

Background Check and Drug Screen

All new and readmitted students are required to demonstrate a clear background check and drug screen prior to enrollment in the ADN (RN) program. The background check requires that students be able to provide a valid social security number or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN). California Board of Registered Nursing Legal Limitation of Licensure: Misdemeanors/Felony Notification

Graduates of the ADN (RN) program are eligible to apply for the NCLEX-RN licensure exam. This requires that applicants submit fingerprints and report any prior conviction or any offense other than minor traffic violations. Failure to report such convictions can be grounds for denial of licensure. The BRN investigates convictions by obtaining information on the underlying facts of the case, dates, and disposition of the case, and subsequent rehabilitation.

Degree and Certificate Options

- Applicants who have met all RCC general education requirements are eligible to earn an ***Associate of Science degree in Vocational Nursing (VN)*** upon completion of the VN program and general education courses.
- Applicants who have not met all RCC general education requirements are eligible to earn a ***Certificate of Achievement*** upon completion of the VN program.

Program Overview

The VN Program requires 12 months of full-time study, excluding the completion of prerequisite courses.

The VN program graduate is eligible to take the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX-PN) for licensure as a Vocational Nurse in the State of California.

- Admission will be denied to an applicant who earned a grade of "C-" or less in a Vocational Nursing Program at another college.
- Foreign transcripts must have a Detailed Evaluation and be submitted by the application deadline. Information can be obtained from the Counseling Office.

- Students must have applied to RCC prior to applying to the VN Program.
- Meeting the minimum requirements of the program does not guarantee admission into the program.

Meeting the minimum eligibility criteria for the program does not guarantee admission to the program.

Anatomy and Physiology Requirement

RCC encourages students to complete the entire series of Anatomy and Physiology at one school. This is due to the concern of possible missing components in curriculum when completed at separate colleges. Nursing applicants that have taken Anatomy and Physiology at two separate colleges are required to receive approval for these courses by requesting a *Request for Equivalencies and Substitutions* form from the Counseling or Evaluations departments.

Selection Procedure

Available enrollment spaces are selected by rank order (highest points) based on points earned on the multicriteria factors and through random selection (see *Vocational Nursing Program Point System*). - First business day of September – Last business day of September to start **SPRING** semester.
- First business day of April- Last business day of April to start **FALL** semester.

Please visit the RCC [RCC School of Nursing Website](#) to complete the application online during the designated application periods.

Requirements for Eligibility

- Applicants must be at least 16 years of age to apply.
- Applicants must have an RCC application on file and be eligible to attend RCC to be considered for admission.
- Applicants must complete and submit a Nursing Assistant Training Program application to the School of Nursing for consideration. Applications may be obtained at RCC School of Nursing website during application filing periods. Please verify current application filing period dates on the Nursing website or School of Nursing at (951) 222-8407.
- Valid United States Social Security number or Individual Taxpayer Identification Number (ITIN) (required for clinical facilities).
- Valid Government issued picture ID (driver's license, identification card, passport, military ID).
- Valid American Heart Association Healthcare Provider CPR card.
- Clear criminal background, including Live Scan fingerprints, and health clearance at the time of program acceptance.
- Completed physical exam and immunizations by designated date on pre-program checklist.

Program Requirements

Required Submissions

Students accepted into the Nursing Assistant Training Program are required to submit:

- Health & physical examination
- Immunization records
- American Heart Association (BLS) Healthcare providers CPR card
- Completed background check through Live Scan (fingerprints).

Health Requirements

Applicants must be free from communicable diseases, infections, psychological disorders, and other conditions that would prevent the successful performance of the responsibilities and tasks required in the training program.

Criminal Background Requirements

Based on guidelines from California Department of Public Health (CDPH), and clinical facility policies; nursing students must have clear criminal background and be fingerprinted to participate in clinical courses. The School of Nursing requires applicants to disclose prior misdemeanor and felony convictions. The applicant must explain the circumstance of the conviction and provide documentation of rehabilitation. The CDPH considers the following in determining eligibility for certification:

- Nature and severity of the offense
- Subsequent acts
- Recency of the acts of crime
- Compliance with court sanctions
- Evidence of rehabilitation

Enrollment Procedure

1. Application will be posted on the RCC [RCC School of Nursing Website](#) during open application period.
2. Student completes application online and submits online. Once the application is submitted you will be notified of receipt.
3. Once the application is received, the Program Specialist, Nursing will verify completion of the application and ensure eligibility requirements have been met.
4. If the application is complete and eligibility requirements have been met, a pre-program checklist will be emailed to the applicant.
5. The applicant will complete the pre-program checklist requirements and will submit the completed packet by the deadline to natp@rcc.edu. The deadline will be provided. The pre-program checklist contains information regarding setting up a Compio account (health records, vaccine verification, CPR card, etc.) along with other important information. Any supplemental documentation such as letters of recommendation, military service, etc. must be submitted to natp@rcc.edu.
6. Eligible applicants who received a pre-program checklist must attend a mandatory Bootcamp on the specified day. During Bootcamp, the applicant will receive another checklist that has information regarding finger printing, uniforms, etc.
7. If all the above is completed by the designated deadlines, the applicant is eligible for acceptance into the NATP program and will be notified via email by the Program Specialist, Nursing.
8. Admission is granted on a first come, first serve based on submission and completion of the pre-program checklist by the deadline and attendance at Bootcamp.

Selection Procedure

Selection of the Nursing Assistant Program will be filled on first-come first-served basis of qualified applicants. RCC reserves the right to designate a certain number of spaces for contract agreements and/or to meet grant-designated outcomes. If a student is not offered a space in the program, a new application is necessary in the next application period.

Requirements

State Certification Requirements

To be eligible to take the state certification exam, students must successfully:

- Earn an overall grade of 75% or above
- Complete all program hours to pass NNA-80

Students are required to meet the state requirements for hours of theory and clinical attendance.

CDPH Identification Requirements

The California Department of Public Health (CDPH) requires:

- A valid social security number or ITIN
- A valid government issued ID for certification.

Health Exam and CPR Certification

Students will be admitted to the program pending submission of a CPR Card (American Heart Association BLS Healthcare Provider) valid for 1 year, and a completed health examination form with clearance permitting unrestricted functional activities essential to nursing practice in accordance with the American with Disabilities Act (1990). Health Exam and CPR Certification are not required at the time of application. To remain enrolled, a student must have a compliant Complio account by the specified due date or the first day of the semester, whichever comes first.

Background Check

All new and readmitting students are required to demonstrate a clear background check. See the *Background Check/Drug Screen* policy in the *SON Enrollment Committee Policy and Procedure Manual* for further details. The background check requires that students be able to provide a valid social security number or Individual Taxpayer Identification (ITIN) number. The process for obtaining the background check is available in the School of Nursing office.

The Professional Certification Branch (PCB), Aide and Technician Certification Section (ATCS) is primarily responsible for the certification of nurse assistants by ensuring applicants adhere to the California Health and Safety Code, Section 1337- 1338.5.

If you fail to disclose your social security number or ITIN, your application for initial or renewal certification will be delayed or rejected.

Fingerprint Requirement

One requirement to qualify for the certification examination is the submission of Live Scan fingerprints. These are evaluated by the California Department of Justice and the F.B.I.

Curriculum Patterns & Course Descriptions

ADN (RN) CURRICULUM PATTERN

First Semester:

- **Nursing 11: Foundations of Nursing Practice Across the Lifespan (8.5 units)**

Nursing 11 focuses on foundational concepts necessary for quality, safe, evidence-based patient-centered nursing care to a diverse patient population across the lifespan. Incorporates application of professionalism, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics for the nurse in a variety of acute care settings. Includes acquisition of nursing skills required in acute care settings. Application of knowledge, skills, and attitudes occurs in the nursing skills lab, simulation lab, and a variety of clinical settings. (81 lecture hours and 216 laboratory hours).

- **Nursing 11A: Nursing Learning Laboratory (Required) (0.5 units)**

On-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides opportunities for deliberate practice of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge, communication, leadership, critical thinking, and informatic skills through active participation in simulated clinical scenarios focused on the nursing care required for diverse patient populations across the lifespan at a beginner novice level. The on-campus required lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus. (27 laboratory hours, Pass/No Pass only).

- **Nursing 11 B/C: Nursing Learning Laboratory (Elective) (B-1 unit/C-2 units)**

An on-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides repetitive practice opportunities of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge and informatics skills at a beginner novice level. The on-campus lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus and is supervised by nursing faculty. (B-54/C-108 laboratory hours, Pass/No Pass only).

Second Semester:

- **Nursing 12: Acute and Chronic Medical-Surgical Nursing Across the Lifespan and Maternity Nursing (8.5 units)**

Nursing 12 focuses on concepts necessary for quality, safe, evidenced-based patient-centered nursing care for diverse patient populations which include childbearing families, chronically ill children, and acute and chronically ill adults. Incorporates application of professionalism, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics for the nurse in a variety of acute and chronic healthcare settings. Includes acquisition of nursing skills required in medical/surgical and maternal-child settings. Application of knowledge, skills, and attitudes occurs in the nursing skills lab, simulation lab, and a variety of clinical settings. (81 lecture hours and 216 laboratory hours).

- **Nursing 12A: Nursing Learning Laboratory (Required) (0.5 units)**

An on-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides opportunities for deliberate practice of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge, communication, leadership, critical thinking, and informatic skills through active participation in simulated clinical scenarios focused on the nursing care required for medical/surgical and maternal-child patients. The on-campus required lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus. (27 hours laboratory, Pass/No Pass only.)

- **Nursing 12B/C: Nursing Learning Laboratory (Elective) (B-1 unit/C- 2 units)**

An on-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides repetitive practice opportunities of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge and informatics skills at a novice level. The on-campus lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus and is supervised by nursing faculty. (B-54 hours/C-108 laboratory hours, Pass/No Pass only.)

Third Semester:

- **Nursing 21: Acute Adult Medical-Surgical and Mental Health Nursing (8.5 units)**

Nursing 21 focuses on concepts necessary for quality, safe, evidenced based patient-centered nursing care to a diverse adult and geriatric patient population experiencing various acute and chronic medical/surgical and mental health conditions. Incorporates the application of professionalism, leadership, caring, collaboration / communication, critical thinking, and informatics for the professional nurse in various healthcare settings. Includes the acquisition of nursing skills required in acute medical/surgical settings and acute and chronic mental health care settings. Application of knowledge, skills, and attitudes occurs in the nursing skills lab, simulation lab, and a variety of clinical settings. (81 lecture hours and 216 laboratory hours).

- **Nursing 21A: Nursing Learning Laboratory (Required) (0.5 units)**

An on-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides opportunities for deliberate practice of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge, communication, leadership, critical thinking, and informatic skills through active participation in simulated clinical scenarios focused on the nursing care required for complex patient populations across the lifespan at an intermediate novice level. The on-campus required lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus. (27 hours laboratory, Pass/No Pass only).

- **Nursing 21B/C: Nursing Learning Laboratory (Elective) (B-1 unit/C- 2 units)**

An on-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides repetitive practice opportunities of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge and informatics

skills at an intermediate novice level. The on-campus lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus and is supervised by nursing faculty. (B-54 hours/C-108 hours laboratory, Pass/No Pass only).

Fourth Semester:

- **Nursing 22: Advanced Medical-Surgical Nursing Across the Lifespan and Acute Pediatrics (8.5 units)**

Nursing 22 focuses on concepts necessary for quality, safe, evidence-based patient-centered nursing care for diverse patient populations experiencing complex alterations in health across the lifespan. Incorporates the application of professionalism, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics for the nurse in a variety of acute and chronic health care settings. Includes acquisition of nursing skills required for patients experiencing complex health alterations across the lifespan. Application of knowledge, skills, and attitudes occurs in the nursing skills lab, simulation lab, and a variety of clinical settings. (81 lecture hours and 216 laboratory hours).

- **Nursing 22A: Nursing Learning Laboratory (Required) (0.5 units)**

An on-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides opportunities for deliberate practice of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge, communication, leadership, critical thinking, and informatic skills through active participation in simulated clinical scenarios focused on the nursing care required for complex patient populations across the lifespan at an advanced beginner level. The on-campus required lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus. (27 hours laboratory, Pass/No Pass only.)

- **Nursing 22B/C: Nursing Learning Laboratory (Elective) (B-1 unit/C-2 units)**

An on-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides repetitive practice opportunities of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge and informatics skills at an advanced beginner level. The on-campus lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus and is supervised by nursing faculty. (B-54 hours/C- 108 hours laboratory, Pass/No Pass only.)

- **Nursing 18: Transition for Advanced Placement Students (2 units)**

Nursing 18 is an introduction to the Associate Degree Nursing program; mission, values, goals, and end-of-program student learning outcomes. Focuses on the concepts of safe, quality evidence-based care, critical thinking, caring, professionalism, leadership, collaboration/communication, and nursing informatics. Assists LVN's with transition to the Associate Degree Registered Nursing program. (36 lecture hours).

- **Nursing 18B: Nursing Learning Laboratory (1 unit)**

An on-campus lab for Licensed Vocational Nurses to demonstrate previously learned clinical nursing skills and teach registered nursing skills from the first-year of the Associate Degree Registered Nursing program. The lab will provide opportunities for deliberate practice of psychomotor nursing skills to attain mastery and apply associated knowledge, communication, leadership, critical thinking, and informatics skills through active participation in simulated clinical scenarios focused on the nursing care of patients. This required lab course is designed to complement the didactic portion of NRN-18. (54 laboratory hours).

- **Nursing 19: Transition Course for Advanced Placement for Non-Nursing Healthcare Professionals (2 units)**

Nursing 19 is an introduction to the Associate Degree Registered Nursing program to prepare qualified non-nursing healthcare professionals to transition to the role of a competent, entry-level professional nurse generalist. Focuses on the concepts of safe, quality evidence-based care, critical thinking, caring, professionalism, leadership, collaboration/communication, and nursing informatics. (36 lecture hours).

- **Nursing 19B: Nursing Learning Laboratory (1 unit)**

An on-campus lab for non-nursing healthcare professionals that introduces clinical nursing skills from the first-year of the Associate Degree Registered Nursing program. The lab provides opportunities for deliberate practice of psychomotor nursing skills to attain mastery and apply associated knowledge, communication, leadership, critical thinking, and informatics skills through active participation in simulated clinical scenarios focused on the nursing care of patients. This required lab course is designed to complement the didactic portion of NRN-19. (54 laboratory hours).

VOCATIONAL NURSING PROGRAM COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Term 1

BIOLOGY 45 SURVEY OF HUMAN ANATOMY & PHYSIOLOGY 3 units

OR

PREREQUISITE: None.

An introductory and survey course of structural and functional aspects of the human body. Emphasis is placed on cell organization, human tissues and discussion of each of the human systems. (54 hours lecture).

BIOLOGY 50A ANATOMY & PHYSIOLOGY I 4 units

PREREQUISITE: BIO 1/1H or BIO 4 or BIO 55 or BIO 60/60H.

AND

First of a two-course sequence that introduces students to the basic concepts and principles of anatomy and physiology. This course will provide a foundation for advanced study of the human body. The course covers body orientation and organization, cells and tissues, the skeletal and muscular systems, and the eye and ear. Designed to meet the prerequisites for professional programs, e.g. nursing, dental hygiene, and physical therapy. (36 hours lecture and 108 hours laboratory).

BIOLOGY 50B ANATOMY & PHYSIOLOGY II 4 units

PREQUISITE: BIO 50A.

Second of a two course sequence in anatomy and physiology that covers these systems: nervous, endocrine, cardiovascular, respiratory, urinary, digestive, and reproductive organ systems. (36 hours lecture and 108 hours laboratory).

PSYCHOLOGY 9 DEVELOPMENTAL PSYCHOLOGY 3 units

PREREQUISITE: None.

Examines the prevailing theories and research of developmental psychology and the stages of human development from conception to death.

NURSING 55A

VOCATIONAL NURSING PRACTICE AND NUTRITION
ACROSS THE LIFESPAN

3 units

PREREQUISITE: None.

Focuses on the definition, functions, responsibilities, and roles of the vocational nursing student, and the Licensed Vocational Nurse as members of the interprofessional healthcare team. Introduces beginning concepts of getting started as a vocational nursing student, understanding the profession of vocational nursing, preparing for successful practice, and moving forward into the profession of a licensed vocational nurse. Introduces the essential nutritional concepts across the life span and therapeutic diet therapy. (54 lecture hours).

NURSING 55B

PRINCIPLES OF PATHOPHYSIOLOGY

2 units

PREREQUISITE: BIO 45 or BIO 50A & BIO 50B.

An introduction to the responses of the body to disease that affect basic human needs. Course topics include introduction to pathophysiology, inflammation and tissue repair, altered immunity, infection, genetic disorders, and altered cellular proliferation and differentiation. (36 hours lecture).

Term 2

NURSING 42

INTRODUCTORY CONCEPTS OF VOCATIONAL NURSING-
FUNDAMENTALS & MENTAL HEALTH

13 units

PREREQUISITE: BIO 45 or BIO 50A & BIO 50B and NVN 55A & NVN 55B and PSYC-9.

Focuses on foundational nursing and mental health concepts necessary in delivering quality, safe, evidence-based, patient-centered care, integrating core concepts of professionalism, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics, to diverse patient populations across the lifespan. Application of knowledge, skills, and attitudes occurs in the clinical nursing skills/simulation labs, deliberate practice, and acute, ambulatory, mental health, and community care settings. (126 lecture hours & 324 laboratory hours).

NURSING 42ANURSING LEARNING LABORATORY

0.5 unit

On-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides opportunities for deliberate practice of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge, communication, leadership, critical thinking, and informatics skills through active participation in simulated clinical scenarios focused on the nursing care required for diverse patient populations across the lifespan and alterations in mental health at a beginner novice level. The on-campus required lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus. (27 laboratory hours).

Term 3NURSING 43INTERMEDIATE CONCEPTS OF VOCATIONAL NURSING-
MATERNITY & PEDIATRICS

5.5 units

PREREQUISITE: NVN 42 & NVN 42A.

Focuses on maternal/child nursing concepts necessary in delivering quality, safe, evidence-based patient-centered care, integrating core concepts of professionalism, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics, to diverse patient-specific populations including infants, children, childbearing, and childrearing families. Application of knowledge, skills, and attitudes occurs in the clinical nursing skills/simulation labs, deliberate practice, and maternal/child healthcare and community settings. (63 lecture hours & 117 laboratory hours).

Term 4NURSING 44INTERMEDIATE CONCEPTS OF VOCATIONAL NURSING-
MEDICAL/SURGICAL

13 units

PREREQUISITE: NVN 43.

Focus on medical-surgical nursing concepts necessary in delivering quality, safe, evidence-based patient-centered care, integrating core concepts of professionalism, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics, to a diverse adult and geriatric patient population experiencing various acute and chronic medical-surgical conditions. Application of knowledge, skills, and attitudes occurs in the clinical nursing skills/simulation labs, deliberate practice, and acute, ambulatory, and community care settings. (126 lecture hours & 324 laboratory hours).

NURSING 44ANURSING LEARNING LABORATORY

0.5 units

On-campus lab that incorporates the application of quality, safe, patient-centered care, leadership, caring, collaboration/communication, critical thinking, and informatics of the nurse using various learning activities. Lab provides opportunities for deliberate practice of nursing skills to attain mastery and apply clinical knowledge, communication, leadership, critical thinking, and informatics skills through active participation in simulated clinical scenarios focused on the nursing care required for diverse patient populations across the lifespan and alterations in mental health at a intermediate novice level. The on-campus required lab course is designed to complement the clinical lab experiences performed off-campus. (27 laboratory hours).

Term 5NURSING 45ADVANCED CONCEPTS OF VOCATIONAL NURSING-MEDICAL/SURGICAL

6 units

PREREQUISITE: NVN 44 & NVN 44A.

3. Submit proof of training:
 - a. Provide a sealed letter from your school confirming equivalent training, including the completion of at least the “Fundamentals of Nursing” course. Ensure the letter includes your name, start and completion dates of the classes and hours or units completed.

 - b. Have official transcripts emailed directly by your training provider or school to cnatranscripts@cdph.ca.gov, including your first name, last name, date of birth, and phone number in the email. Only transcripts can be emailed, the application package must be submitted via U.S. Postal Mail.

PROCEDURE FOR SELECTION OF ADN (RN) STUDENTS

Available enrollment spaces are selected by rank order (highest points) of the multicriteria factors and random selection (see *Enrollment Criteria for Traditional, CEP, Advanced Placement/Transfer Students*). Riverside City College reserves the right to designate a certain number of spaces for contract agreements and/or meet requirements of grant-designated outcomes.

Applicants with a regionally accredited bachelor's degree from the United States (US) will be waived from completing the 6 general education courses, but must have taken the science prerequisites, satisfy the Statistics (STAT C1000/C1000H, formerly MAT-12/12H, or PSYC/SOC-48) and PSYC-9 requirements, and have taken courses in English Composition, Communication and Sociology/Cultural Anthropology.

Applicants must pass the Test for Essential Academic Skills (ATI TEAS – TEAS 7) prior to program enrollment. Please see the *RCC SON TEAS Test* policy.

- Applicants must earn a minimum score of 62 on the TEAS to be eligible for enrollment in the ADN (RN) program. A student may re-take the TEAS every 365 days to improve their score.
- Applicants will be required to attach their **unofficial** TEAS transcript from ATI when completing the application for the ADN (RN) program. In addition, **official** TEAS transcripts must be submitted electronically to RCC via ATI (www.atitesting.com). ATI charges a transcript fee for the TEAS official transcript. Use the code RIVERSIDE CC ADN when sending the official TEAS transcript from ATI (www.atitesting.com).
- Applicants who have not met the minimum passing score of 62 on the first attempt, will be referred to the Nursing Counselor to develop a remediation plan in the respective areas of English, Reading, Mathematics, and/or Science. The length of this remediation shall be approximately twelve (12) months, depending on each student's identified area(s) of difficulty. Students must provide verification of completion of their remediation to the Nursing Counselor.

If a student is not offered a space in the program, a new application is necessary for the next application filing period. The School of Nursing has no wait list.

PROCEDURES FOR SELECTION OF VN STUDENTS

Selection for the VN program is competitive, with a varying percentage of spaces going to fully qualified applicants with the highest points (*see Vocational Nursing Program Point System*) and a varying percentage filled by random selection of qualified applicants. RCC reserves the right to designate a certain number of spaces for contract agreements and/or to meet grant-designated outcomes.

1. Qualified applicants are ranked according to the *Vocational Nursing Program Point System* for admission to the program.
2. All students accepted to the VN program will be required to sign the *Vocational Nursing Program Completion Contract*.
3. In the event there are no qualified returning VN candidates to fill any VN course spaces, ADN (RN) students who have failed an ADN (RN) course may be considered for appropriate placement in the VN program.
4. If an applicant is not offered a space in the program, a new application is necessary for the next application filing period. The School of Nursing has no wait list.

PROCEDURES FOR SELECTION OF NATP STUDENTS

1. Applications are submitted during the application filing period.
2. Qualified applicants that meet eligibility requirements are emailed a pre-program checklist.
3. Admission is based on a first come, first serve basis upon completion and submission of the pre-program checklist to the Program Specialist, Nursing by the designated deadline. All requirements are to be submitted via email to natp@rcc.edu.
4. If the applicant completes the pre-program checklist requirements by the designated deadline, the applicant is deemed eligible for acceptance and notified by a Program Specialist, Nursing via email.
5. If an applicant is not offered a space in the program, a new application is necessary for the next application filing period. The School of Nursing has no wait list.

TEAS TEST POLICY

The Test for Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) is required for all applicants prior to enrollment in the ADN (RN) program. The TEAS score is part of the *Enrollment Criteria for Traditional* and/or *RCC-CSU Concurrent Enrollment* point system used for admission.

The RCC School of Nursing offers the TEAS test twice a year. The top 120 – 150 applicants who have earned the highest science GPA (BIO-50A, BIO-50B & BIO-55) and completed Psychology 9 will be invited to take the TEAS free of charge at RCC. Those not invited may take the TEAS at another ATI testing site at their own expense.

Applicants must earn a minimum score of 62 on the TEAS to be eligible for enrollment in the ADN (RN) program. A student may re-take the TEAS every 365 days to improve their score.

Applicants will be required to attach their **unofficial** TEAS transcript from ATI when completing the application for the ADN (RN) program. In addition, **official** TEAS transcripts must be submitted electronically to RCC via ATI (www.atitesting.com). ATI charges a transcript fee for the TEAS official transcript. Use the code RIVERSIDE CC ADN when sending the official TEAS transcript from ATI (www.atitesting.com).

Applicants who have not met the minimum passing score of 62 on the first attempt, will be referred to the Nursing Counselor to develop a remediation plan in the respective areas of English, Reading, Mathematics, and/or Science. The length of this remediation shall be approximately twelve (12) months, depending on each student's identified area(s) of difficulty. Students must provide verification of completion of their remediation to the Nursing Counselor.

- Students will have twelve (12) months to remediate and demonstrate readiness to retake the TEAS test. The period of remediation shall commence on the date the applicant is notified to contact the Nursing Counselor that a remediation plan is needed.
- If on the second attempt or other subsequent attempts, the student does not earn a minimum passing score of 62, the student may re-take the TEAS test every 365 days or complete a Vocational Nursing (VN) program and then attempt to bridge as an Advanced Placement student to the ADN (RN) program.
 - RCC VN graduates have priority over graduates from other VN programs.
 - The VN program prerequisites are BIO-50A/50B or BIO-45, PSYC-9, NVN-55A, NVN-55B and to have a current, valid California CNA certificate.
 - The VN application period is the first business day of February – the first business day of March.

DEFERRED ENROLLMENT

1. Deferred enrollment may be granted on an individual basis upon approval by the Dean, School of Nursing and/or Nursing Enrollment Committee.
2. Deferred enrollment of a student's admission space is allowed **one-time only**.
 - a. Students who do not accept their admission space after receiving an approved deferral will be considered for readmission **one-time-only**. The student's ranking for readmission will be based on the *Prioritization for Readmission* policy.
 - b. Students who defer and have an approved *RCC Extenuating Circumstance Petition (ECP)* will be reviewed by the Nursing Enrollment Committee depending on space availability.
3. Students who defer their enrollment space for 18 months or longer, may be required to complete a *Contract for Success* and audit the last course they completed.

COURSE REGISTRATION CLEARANCE

The following areas for clearance are required for enrollment in nursing courses:

1. Health and CPR requirements

Students are cleared to register once they have a compliant Complio account which requires the submission of the following: a current CPR card (AHA BLS Healthcare Provider Course) for the semester, required immunizations, and a completed physical examination confirming they can perform all essential nursing functions without restriction in accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (1990). A compliant Complio is required throughout the program.

2. Background check/Drug screen

All new and readmitting students are required to demonstrate a clear background check/drug screen prior to enrollment in clinical courses. The process for obtaining a background check/drug screen is available in the School of Nursing office. A picture ID and social security or ITIN number are also required. See policy on *Background Check/Drug Screen*.

3. License Verification for Advanced Placement Students

LVN's and non-nursing healthcare professionals advance placing into the ADN (RN) program must show proof of professional licensure for subsequent enrollment in the ADN (RN) program.

4. Exit Interview/Contract for Success

For petitioning students, completion of all criteria for readmission as outlined on the *Exit Interview/Contract for Success* must be submitted by the required due date prior to course enrollment.

CLINICAL ROTATION REGISTRATION AND AGENCY ONBOARDING POLICY

The following guidelines must be adhered to for all clinical rotations within the School of Nursing (SON) to ensure that paperwork is submitted to clinical agencies by their required deadlines.

Clinical Rotation Registration

1. Students will not be permitted to switch rotations once they have registered. Students will be returned to their original rotation if an unapproved change has been made.
2. The SON maintains the right to place students in clinical rotations, change rotation sites, and/or close clinical rotations at their discretion if needed.

Clinical Agency Onboarding and Orientation

1. Clinical orientation time shall be considered “time that students actually spend with faculty in the clinical agency or on campus.”
2. Clinical agency requirements must be completed by the student independently and are not considered part of the clinical orientation time. Students will not receive “time back” for time spent on clinical requirements such as online orientation and fingerprinting/background checks. These requirements are part of the students’ clinical responsibilities.
3. Clinical agencies may require additional fees, which may be required to be paid by the student.
4. By the specified deadline at the end of each semester, students must complete the clinical agency onboarding requirements for the upcoming semester. These requirements can be found on the *RCC-SON Student Resource Canvas* page. Students who do not submit clinical agency requirements by the deadline will earn an *Incomplete* grade for the current semester and will not be able to progress to the next semester until the *Incomplete* grade is resolved. Students are required to check their RCCD email during the intersession for additional requirements.
5. Timely completion of all clinical agency onboarding requirements is essential. Failure to do so will compromise a student's ability to meet course and end-of-program student learning outcomes and will impede progression in the program.

POLICY & PROCEDURE: BACKGROUND CHECK/DRUG SCREEN

Nursing students must have a clear background check and drug screen for courses that include clinical experiences outside of the School of Nursing (SON). Anytime a student has a break in enrollment in the SON due to withdrawing or failing a course, a new background check and drug screen will be required.

Background Check/Drug Screen results, while confidential, will be reviewed by the Program Specialist and Dean, School of Nursing. Additionally, results may be reviewed by the Clinical Placement Coordinator, Nursing Enrollment Committee members, and clinical agency personnel, as needed.

Background Check Requirements

1. Students must have a clear background check and will be provided instructions upon admission to the SON. Students may have to have additional background clearance requirements, upon admission or readmission, to attend clinical based on clinical agency guidelines.
2. Students will be provided a deadline date by which the background check results must be submitted to the Dean, School of Nursing.
3. Students who do not complete a background check by the deadline date will not be allowed to register for classes. Students must provide consent to allow the SON and clinical agencies, as necessary, access to the background check results.
4. Background checks will minimally include the following:
 - Seven years history
 - Address verification
 - Sex offender search
 - Two names (current legal and one other name)
 - All counties
 - Office of Inspection General (OIG) search
 - Social Security Number verification
5. Students may be denied enrollment in the School of Nursing who have felony and/or related misdemeanor convictions on their record(s). Convictions will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.
6. Students denied enrollment due to criminal convictions may reapply to the program when it has been seven (7) years since the conviction date, or when they receive a dismissal, expungement, or certificate of rehabilitation from the court. However, even with a dismissal, expungement, or certificate, students may still be denied access by clinical facilities, based on the nature of the convictions even though the convictions may have occurred more than seven (7) years ago. Clinical rotations are a mandatory part of required coursework in the ADN (RN) and VN programs. If a student cannot participate in clinical, they will be denied enrollment into the program they were accepted to as they will be unable to complete the nursing program. The SON must abide by each clinical agency's requirements for students to participate in clinical experiences. Clinical agencies may have different requirements, thus have the authority to approve or disapprove a student's participation at the clinical agency.
7. Students on probation, parole, or who have outstanding bench warrants or any unpaid citations, restitution, etc., will not be permitted to enroll in the program until all outstanding issues are resolved.
8. The following convictions, even if they have been dismissed, will prevent the student from being able to participate in clinical rotations:
 - Murder
 - Assault/battery

- Sexual offenses/sexual assault/abuse
- Certain drug or drug related offenses
- Alcohol-related offenses (without certificate of rehabilitation)
- Other felonies involving weapons and/or violent crimes
- Class B and Class A misdemeanor theft
- Felony theft
- Fraud

9. Although students have passed the *Riverside City College, School of Nursing Background Check* for entry into the Nursing program, this does not guarantee students will pass a background check for the National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX) or future employment. Any convictions (expunged or dismissed) can be a reason to deny or delay licensure by the California Board of Registered Nursing (BRN) or Board of Vocational Nursing Psychiatric Technicians (BVNPT).

Drug Screen

1. Students must have a negative drug screen (10 panel) and will be provided instructions upon admission to the SON. Students may have to have additional drug screen requirements, upon admission or readmission, to attend clinical based on clinical agency guidelines.
2. Students will be provided a deadline date by which the drug screen results must be submitted to the Dean, School of Nursing.
3. Students who do not complete a drug screen by the deadline date will not be allowed to register for classes. Students must provide consent to allow the SON and clinical agencies, as necessary, access to the drug screen results.
4. Clinical rotations are a mandatory part of required coursework in the ADN (RN) and VN programs. If a student cannot participate in clinical, they will be denied enrollment into the program they were accepted to as they will be unable to complete the nursing program. The SON must abide by each clinical agency's requirements for students to participate in clinical experiences. Clinical agencies may have different requirements, thus have the authority to approve or disapprove a student's participation at the clinical agency.

TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS

Purpose: To ensure that all students enrolled in the ADN (RN) and Vocational Nursing (VN) programs have clear, equitable, and timely access to the minimum technology specifications required for academic success, remote learning (if applicable), electronic testing, and digital clinical simulation.

The SON requires all enrolled students to have an Apple iPad and internet connectivity that meet the minimum technical specifications of the program.

- These requirements apply equally to all students regardless of program option (RN or VN).
- Technology requirements are reviewed annually by the nursing faculty and the Department Chairs to ensure alignment with instructional platforms and external testing vendors.
- Any modifications to technology requirements will be published and communicated to prospective and current students before the start of the academic term.

The technology requirements outlined in this policy are published and accessible through:

1. **Enrollment Handbook:** Nursing program webpages on the RCC website.
2. **Information Sheets:** All pathway options for the ADN (RN) and VN programs.
3. **Student Handbooks:** ADN (RN) and VN Student Handbooks (updated annually) on the SON Student Resource Canvas course and nursing program webpages on the RCC website.
4. **Course Syllabi:** Included in the standard syllabus template for all nursing courses.
5. **Pre-Program Checklist:** Provided to all newly admitted students based on their program option prior to the start of the semester.

Operating Procedures

1. Minimum Hardware and Software Specifications

Students must have access to an Apple iPad that supports iOS 24 or above. Students do have the option to participate in the SON iPad Loaner program if they are unable to purchase an iPad, as funding is available. A desktop or laptop computer (Windows or macOS) is optional and meet the following criteria:

- **Boot Camp:** All incoming ADN (RN) and VN students receive initial orientation to Wolters Kluwer/Lippincott, Elsevier, and ATI required resources at Boot Camp. The Director, Simulation & Learning Labs introduces the use of the Apple iPad and provides students will additionally resources on the SON Student Resource Canvas course. All incoming students are offered additional training for Wolters Kluwer/Lippincott and ATI resources in the first three weeks of the semester by the vendors.

If the applicant does not pass the Advanced Placement Exam on his/her second attempt, the applicant is not eligible for advanced placement and must apply the ADN (RN) program as a traditional student.
2. The minimum passing score is 75%.
3. Should the advanced placement applicant accept an admission space in Nursing 12 or 21, s/he is responsible for all knowledge and skills covered in previous semester(s) of the RCC ADN (RN) program.

SKILLS COMPETENCY

1. Applicants who are applying for advanced placement into Nursing 12 and/or 21 are responsible for all knowledge and skills covered in previous semesters of the RCC ADN (RN) program. Please reference ADN (RN) *Nursing Skills Across the Curriculum* provided in Nursing 18B or 19B.
2. Any skills related to the registered nurse scope of practice (venipuncture, intravenous insertion, administration of intravenous medications [IV push, IVPB, and primary IV fluids], blood product administration, management of PCA infusion, central line dressing changes), will be taught in Nursing 18B or 19B and reviewed during Boot Camp once admitted to the ADN (RN) program.

Readmission

ELIGIBILITY FOR READMISSION

1. A student who is eligible and applying for readmission to the ADN (RN) or VN program, due to withdrawal or earning a failing grade in a nursing course, must submit an online *Petition for Readmission* immediately after notification of the failing grade. *Petitions for Readmission* must be on file by the final Nursing Enrollment Committee meeting of the semester.
2. Students will be allowed to be **READMITTED ONE TIME ONLY** during their program of study. Readmission is not guaranteed and depends on space availability.
3. Students petitioning for readmission will be ranked according to the *Prioritization of Readmission* policy.
4. If a student withdraws or earns a failing seminar and/or less-than-satisfactory clinical performance grade, the nursing faculty, in collaboration with the student, will develop a *Contract for Success* outlining specific activities to assist the student in strengthening the area(s) of concern and/or less-than-satisfactory clinical performance upon readmission. The goal of the success contract is to improve the student's chances of achieving their course student learning outcomes. The student will provide documentation of successfully having met the recommendations specified in the contract and turn in the completed documentation by the specified due date.
 - a. A student who is out more than one semester and was not granted immediate readmission for the subsequent semester must contact the semester-level faculty to develop a new *Contract for Success*.
 - b. Each semester a student is out of the program, a new remediation contract must be developed. It is the student's responsibility to maintain contact with the semester-level faculty for renewal of the *Contract for Success* until readmission is granted.
5. A student petitioning for readmission who is placed on the alternate list but not admitted will be granted priority admission the following semester, provided all remediation requirements are met and space availability.
6. A student who has not been readmitted for two semesters will be granted priority admission, provided all remediation requirements are met and space availability.
7. Students who earn an *Unsafe* clinical performance grade or a *Gross Misconduct* for professional/ethical behaviors are ineligible for readmission.

ADN (RN) Program only

1. A student who earns a failing grade in theory and/or withdraws from the ADN (RN) will be allowed to be **READMITTED ONE TIME ONLY**.

The following are exceptions to this one-time-only readmission policy:

- a. A student who petitions to have extenuating circumstances considered. The *RCC Extenuating Circumstances* form from Admissions & Records must be submitted online. The student must complete the *Petition for Readmission* online prior to the final Nursing Enrollment Committee meeting of the semester.
- b. A student who earns a second failing grade in their final semester of the ADN (RN) program and has earned *Satisfactory* clinical performance grades throughout the program may be considered for readmission, pending space availability, in congruence with college policy.

VN Program only

- 1. A student who earns a failing grade in theory and/or withdraws from the VN will be allowed to be **READMITTED ONE TIME ONLY**.

The following are exceptions to this one-time-only readmission policy:

- a. A student who petitions to have extenuating circumstances considered. The *RCC Extenuating Circumstances* form from Admissions & Records must be submitted online. The student must complete the *Petition for Readmission* online prior to the final Nursing Enrollment Committee meeting of the semester.
- b. A student who earns a second failing grade in their final semester of the VN program and has earned *Satisfactory* clinical performance grades throughout the program may be considered for readmission, pending space availability, in congruence with college policy.

PRIORITIZATION FOR READMISSION

The purpose of this policy is to rank applicants who are applying for transfer, advanced placement, or petitioning for readmission when there are more applicants than enrollment spaces available.

1. At the close of the application periods all fully qualified applicants are ranked according to their points based on the multi-criteria and admitted based on space availability.
2. If additional spaces are available at the end of the semester, those applicants who completed coursework in progress will be considered, thus meeting minimum admission criteria, and will be ranked according to the *Priority for Selection* criteria outlined below and admitted based on space availability.
3. In the event inadequate spaces are available in Nursing 21 for all qualified advanced placement applicants, available Nursing 11 and 12 spaces will be offered to applicants who were successful in passing the *HESI Advanced Placement Exam*, pending space availability. Applicants applying for advanced placement who failed the *HESI Advanced Placement Exam* will have to apply to the ADN (RN) program for Nursing 11.
4. Applicants seeking readmission must meet the criteria outlined in the *Eligibility for Readmission* policy in order to be considered.
5. If more than one applicant has the same ranking, and there are insufficient spaces to accommodate all applicants, those petitions will be ranked according to the *Ranking Tied Applicants for Admission* policy. Students who have been called to active military duty will be given priority for readmission.
6. Students petitioning for readmission will be ranked based on the student's seminar grade at the time of withdrawing from the course or at the conclusion of the course.
7. *Priority for Selection*

A nursing student who:

- a. Withdrew from the ADN (RN) or VN program prior to the first exam and has not been issued a seminar or clinical grade and has not received any *Performance Improvement Plans (PIPs)* during the current semester.
- b. Withdrew from the ADN (RN) or VN program in satisfactory seminar and clinical standing and has not received any *Performance Improvement Plans (PIPs)* during the current semester.
- c. Withdrew from the ADN (RN) or VN program in satisfactory seminar and clinical standing and has received one or more *Performance Improvement Plans (PIPs)* during the current semester.

- d. Withdrew or earned a failing seminar grade but earned a *Satisfactory* clinical performance grade. Students in this category, who have not been readmitted for two semesters will be granted priority admission, provided all remediation requirements are met and space availability.
- e. Withdrew or earned a “C” (75%) or better seminar grade but has earned a *Minimal Performance* clinical grade during the current semester.
- f. Withdrew or earned a “C” (75%) or better seminar grade but has earned an *Unsatisfactory* clinical performance grade as the last earned clinical grade.
- g. Earned a failing seminar grade and a *Minimal Performance* clinical grade during the current semester.
- h. Earned a failing seminar grade and an *Unsatisfactory* clinical performance grade during the current semester.
- j. Earned a second failing seminar grade in their final semester of the ADN (RN) or VN program and has earned *Satisfactory* clinical performance grades throughout the program.

ASSIGNMENT OF INCOMPLETE GRADE

Students are not to re-enroll for a course in which a grade of 'I' has been recorded. Incomplete academic work for unforeseeable, emergency and justifiable reasons at the end of the term may result in an 'I' symbol being entered on the student's record. The condition for removal of the 'I' shall be stated by the instructor on the Incomplete Contract. Students receiving an Incomplete ('I') may print out the Incomplete Contract on MyPortal/WebAdvisor (*RCC Student Handbook*).

1. A student who is unable to attend clinical and in theory after the withdrawal date, may be eligible for consideration for an *Incomplete Grade Contract*. Upon successful completion of the *Incomplete Grade Contract*, the student will be:
 - a. Required to submit a *Petition for Readmission* to the School of Nursing.
 - b. Readmitted to the School of Nursing pending space available.
 - c. Placed in the appropriate nursing semester/course pool.
2. Students have up to one year to complete an incomplete or the grade will become an "F" or whatever grade the instructor puts on the *Incomplete Grade Contract* form.
3. A student who earns an unsatisfactory clinical grade and/or less than a 75% ("C") grade in theory will be ineligible for an *Incomplete Grade Contract*. The student will be:
 - a. Required to submit a *Petition for Readmission* to the School of Nursing.
 - b. Subject to the *One Time Only* readmission criteria cited in the *Eligibility for Readmission* policy.
 - c. Placed on the designated nursing semester/course list of applicants.

The applicant is assigned a permanent, non-revocable, non-graduate status. This non-graduate status may prohibit endorsement by other states and hinder employment and further educational opportunities in nursing. The applicant must follow Board of Registered Nursing procedure for application for NCLEX-RN.

NCLEX-RN ELIGIBILITY
FOREIGN GRADUATES WITH BRN-IDENTIFIED AREAS OF DEFICIENCY

The BRN may require graduates of foreign nursing schools to enroll in nursing courses or portions of nursing courses to meet the NCLEX-RN eligibility requirements (*section 1410.4 (b), Business and Professions Code*). Foreign graduates may petition the Dean, School of Nursing, by submitting the letter from the BRN identifying areas of deficiency. Appropriate placement will be awarded on a space available basis. A student in this category would not be required to meet the RCC graduation requirements and would not be a graduate of the ADN (RN) program.

The following procedure will be followed when graduates of foreign nursing programs request to remediate deficiencies identified by the BRN to establish eligibility for the NCLEX-RN:

1. Documentation of the BRN requirement will be provided by the foreign nursing graduates to the Program Specialist, Nursing.
2. Request forwarded by the Program Specialist, Nursing to the Nursing Enrollment Committee and/or Dean, School of Nursing for approval and establishment of conditions for enrollment.
3. Enrollment of additional students in the designated semester will occur pending approval from the semester-level faculty.

NOTE: *To participate in any other content, students must follow Advanced Placement/Transfer application procedures.*

NCLEX-RN ELIGIBILITY: FELONY NOTIFICATION

According to the *California Business and Professions Code (Licensee: Division 1.5. Denial, Suspension, and Revocation of Licenses; Chapter 2. Denial of Licenses), Section 480:*

- (a) A board may deny a license regulated by this code on the grounds that the applicant has one of the following:
 - (1) Been convicted of a crime or has been subject to formal discipline . . .
 - (1a) Convicted of a serious felony, as defined in Section 1192.7 of the Penal Code or a crime for which registration is required...
 - (1b) Convicted of a financial crime currently classified as a felony that is directly and adversely related to the fiduciary qualifications, functions, or duties of the profession for which the application is made. . .
 - (2) Professional misconduct that is substantially related to the qualifications, functions, or duties of the profession for which the application is made...
 - (2e) The board may deny a license . . . if applicant knowingly made a false statement of fact on the license application and only if the crime or act is substantially related to the qualifications, functions or duties of the . . . profession for which the application is made.
- (2b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this code, a person shall not be denied a license on the basis that the person has been convicted of a crime, or on the basis of acts underlying a conviction for a crime, if that person has obtained a certificate of rehabilitation under Chapter 3.5 (Section 4852.01) of Title 6 of Part 3 Penal Code, has been granted clemency or a pardon by a state or federal executive, or has made a showing of rehabilitation pursuant to Section 482.
- (2c) Notwithstanding any other provisions of this code, a person shall not be denied a license on the basis of a conviction, or on the basis of the acts underlying the conviction, that has been dismissed pursuant to Section 1203.4, 1203.4a, 1203.41 or 1203.425 of the Penal Code or a comparable dismissal or expungement. An applicant who has a conviction that has been dismissed pursuant to Section 1203.4, 1203.4a, 1203.41, or 1203.42 of the Penal Code shall provide proof of the dismissal if it is not reflected on the report furnished by the Department of Justice.

Graduates of the ADN (RN) program are eligible to apply to take the National Council Licensing Examination (NCLEX-RN) for licensure as a Registered Nurse. Applicants must submit Live Scan fingerprints and report convictions of any offenses other than minor traffic violations. Failure to report such convictions will be grounds for denial of license. The Board of Registered Nursing investigates convictions by obtaining information on the underlying facts of the case, dates and disposition of the case, and subsequent rehabilitation.
